CAVALRY CLOSING IN UPON VILLA IS THE LATEST REPORT

Colonel Dodd Pressing On Heels of Fleeing Bandits In Mexico

By E. T. Conkie. El Paso, Texas, March 25.—Francisco Villa's main force of 200 men in Santa Clara canyon, 30 miles from its western entrance, with Colonel George Dodd's cavalry close upon him.

General Gavia asserted in a statement to the United States today. Villa is nearly surrounded, Gavia declared. His only avenue of escape is through the eastern entrance to the canyon.

Arrivals from Chihuahua City reported General Luis Herrera was still loyal, and was in Chihuahua with his troops. Military agents are tracing munitions shipment to Juarez, in order to prevent Villa from obtaining them.

Reports Not Confirmed. Douglas, Ariz., March 25.—In face of persistent rumors that three Americans, two men and a woman, were murdered by Mexicans west of Gibson's ranch, near here, the military authorities today had no confirmation of the reported outrage.

Permission for 60,000 rounds of ammunition, said to be a portion of 5,000, 000 rounds ordered from East Altona, Ill. to cross the border was withheld today. The ammunition is consigned to Governor Calles at Agua Prieta.

Several hundred de facto troops are camped at Agua Prieta today but the American officers have no fear of trouble. Governor Calles reported General Gomez, with 4,000 Carranzistas at Moctezuma. Calles had no news of Villa today.

Suicide of Officer Not Yet Explained

Paget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton, Wash., Mar. 25.—Whether "too much Orient," or entanglements outside of the service influenced young Lieutenant O. C. Paithorp to step into his room aboard the U. S. cruiser Saratoga, close the door, and send a bullet through his heart yesterday, is the problem that is puzzling officers and men at the Paget Sound navy yard today.

Officers opened the door and saw Paithorp lying dead on the floor. His pistol, with one chamber empty, was lying a foot from his body.

Brother officers maintain that the reason for the suicide will have to be sought outside of Paithorp's naval record, his work, and his small circle of friends.

He graduated from the naval academy at Annapolis in 1910. Paithorp was immediately assigned to duty on the Saratoga which was sent to the China station where it remained for six years, returning to the Pacific station recently.

Arguments Monday In Slaughter Case

Oroville, Cal., Mar. 25.—Jury argument in the trial of Rev. Madison Slaughter charged with attacking Gertrude Lamson, aged 15, starts Monday. Attorneys for the prosecution will open and close the debate on the pastor's guilt or innocence. It is expected that the case will go to the jury Tuesday.

Wall Street Waits On Foreign Questions

New York, March 25.—The New York Evening Sun's financial review today said: Wall Street continued its waiting attitude, and barely more than a nominal market prevailed. No new features entered into speculative considerations, but uncertainty with regard to Mexico and the European situation continued.

The first hour's heaviness was accentuated in the closing half of the session when war stocks and specialties declined. Railways and standard industrial reacted fractionally.

The torpedoing of the Englishman and other recent German submarine blows occasioned some apprehension regarding the European diplomatic situation.

London, Mar. 25.—Hasty arrangements were made today to outfit a relief ship which will be sent in search of Lieutenant Sir Ernest H. Shackleton, British Antarctic explorer, whose fate is in doubt in the light of recent developments.

Although it was reported at Sydney, N. S. W., that Lieutenant Shackleton had succeeded in crossing the Antarctic continent with his expedition, a garbled wireless message throwing doubt on the story was received later from the steamer Aurora which had been sent to bring him back.

Shackleton's friends here today urged the New Zealanders to try and get in wireless communication with the Aurora again.
