Salem Fruit Union Disposes of Surplus Crop of Beans with Satisfaction

Beans are neither fresh or dried fruit yet. Maung Robert Paulus of the Salem Fruit Union, handled several tons of this staple product this season with good results for the growers who happened to be members of the union. The price secured for the beans was from \$20 to \$25 a ton higher than that paid in the local markets here and they were handled after the local market had been supplied and beans were more or less of a drug. Manager Paulus said that he could have sold several tons more had the growers been able to supply him.

Indictments Against Steel Trust Quashed

Youngstown, Ohio, Mar. 28.—In dismissing indictments against Judge E. H. Gary, United States Steel and other steel corporations today, Judge Anderson ruled that labor was not a commodity, and that therefore it could not be placed under the terms of the state anti-trust act. The defendants were accused of conspiring to keep down the price of labor and to raise the price of their output. It is not believed there will be an attempt to renew the indictments.

Washington, March 28.—The house public lands committee today struck out section seven of the Oregon California lands bill. This action leaves John Lind and other holders of large uncompleted contracts to be dealt with by subsequent legislation.

Mission at St. Paul's Is Well Attended

Greeted by a full church, the Rev. E. V. Shaylor last night opened a mission at St. Paul's church to continue all this week. After a hymn and prayers, the pastor, the Rev. Robert S. Gill, briefly introduced the mission, and then taking his stool from his own shoulders, placed it on those of Mr. Shaylor, in token and symbol of conferring on him the cure of souls in the parish for the week.

Mr. Shaylor took as the text for his address on "A Venture of Faith," the narrative from St. Luke's gospel of the great draught of fishes. "We are like these fishermen," said the preacher. "They had toiled all night and garnered nothing but a harvest of weeds; they were cleaning their nets when Jesus of Nazareth passed by. We, too, perhaps feel, that in our lives we have toiled and struggled, and have gotten nothing for our pains but a harvest of weeds; we seem to have missed the deeper satisfactions of life. "Launch out into the deep," is the command. We have been fishing the shallows—merely glancing at living, babbling in religion. Our common sense ought to tell us that there are no fish to be found in the shallows, but only in the deep. It was a venture of faith for these fishermen to launch out into the deep; and so it is with us. But there are no great results without such a venture."

The speaker created for himself last night a profound impression of his ability, personality, fervency and sincerity. He will preach tonight on "Man's Greatest Challenge." The subject for the men's mass meeting, dated for Sunday afternoon at 3 p. m., and not previously announced is "The Trinity of Hell, and the Trinity of Heaven."
