San Antonio, Texas, the Unofficial Capital of Mexico

San Antonio, Mar. 29.—For the last three years San Antonio has been the unofficial capital of Mexico. Here the rival juntas of the Carranza and Villa forces have plotted and intrigued. From San Antonio most of the financial aid so desperately needed by both sides at various times in the ups and downs of their fortunes has been negotiations and from here munitions have been bought and supplies forwarded.

Today there are over fifteen hundred prominent and formerly wealthy Mexicans living in San Antonio. Every one of them is vitally interested in the success of either Carranza or Villa.

Many of them are men who in the last few years have held the highest official positions in one or the other of the shifting governments that have held temporary sway over the southern republic, or parts of it.

Four cabinet ministers of the old Huerta regime, the most prominent being Manuel Garza Aldape, ex-minister of agriculture and Richard Gomez Robelo, attorney general for Huerta, and the man who guided the old Indian warrior in the tortuous legal phases of his conflict with President Wilson.

Closely associated with them is Salome Botella, ex-governor of the state of Nuevo Leon under Huerta. This group is now reputed to be interested in Villa's campaign.

30 bishops who have been driven out of Mexico by the various warring factions. With them are a large number of priests who also were compelled to flee from the country.

Then there is a sprinkling of adherents of the ebullient Felix Diaz, who always has a revolution ripe for picking if he can secure support; and also there are some supporters of Zapata.

The interests of Carranza are officially administered by Teodoro R. Beltran, Mexican consul general for the southwestern United States.

Connected with his office in an unofficial but very important capacity is Sam Belden, a San Antonio attorney, who has a title of chief advisor of the consulate. Belden is reputed to be close to Carranza and one of the men who in dealings with the United States government the first chief is first to turn to for advice.

There are seven Mexican newspapers published in San Antonio to serve the needs of the forty odd thousand native Mexicans who live in and about the city. All are bitterly partisan in backing their fractional interests and several have very fair circulations.

Was graduated from the University of Toronto with high honors.

Teacher of mathematics and secretary of St. Helen's hall, Portland, 1901-1904.

Teacher and secretary of a school at San Mateo, Cal., 1904-1905.

Teacher of mathematics in the Portland high school, 1907.

Married and became a resident of Salem 1906.

Had full charge of the books and the business department of the Woodburn Water Works company, 1909-1912.

Member of the Woman's club of Salem since 1906, serving on the executive board. At present member of the educational committee of the Woman's club and also on the building committee.

Member of the city public library board for the past six years, and president of the board for the past four years.

Seven business men of Salem and two women are on this board and the men thought so much of her executive ability that she has been president for four years.

Studied law at Willamette university, graduated from the law department and was admitted to the bar in 1915.

Brig. Gen. John J. Pershing "The Man of Sorrow"

(By United Press.)

Washington, Mar. 29.—A fighting soldier who wins battles by diplomacy is a rarity. But that is the distinction accorded Brigadier General John J. Pershing, the "man of sorrow" of the army, whose beautiful wife and three baby girl children were burned to death in a fire that destroyed their home in San Francisco, August 27, 1915.

Many and picturesque are the tales told of this Boon Brummel of the army; a handsome, dashing soldier; brilliant and bloody in battle, equally brilliant in bloodless conquests; hero of romance and strife; a linguist, diplomat, scholar; a man who won his rank as much through peaceful conquering of his enemies as through daring leadership in military campaigns against them.

Pershing and the Philippines are synonymous. It was Pershing, then Captain Pershing of the First, later the Fifteenth, Cavalry—who drew the task of subduing the fanatical Moros on Mindanao and Jolo. He was given 2,500 men—and free reign. Not one of those men was sacrificed in battle.

Instead of beginning a war of extermination against the Moros, Captain Pershing began a study of their language. He soon mastered their tongue. He assembled the Moros, fanatical Mohammedans, on Fridays, (their Sundays), and taking texts from the Koran talked to them on reconciliation with the United States government.

In this way, without fighting a single battle, he won all but two of the mountain tribes, and was consecrated a Datu by the Sultans of the tribes.

But with the two tribes who spurned his efforts at peaceful conquest, he showed relentless and crushing power. Their strong mountain forts fell before his onslaught until forty had been captured and their last stronghold taken.

One hundred and seventy-five Moros paid the extreme penalty in battle for their folly. Only 13 American soldiers were wounded, none killed.

His conquest in Mindanao resulted in Pershing's appointment as Adjutant General of that island and Jolo, and Colonel Roosevelt, then President, surprised the entire army organization by promoting him over the heads of 302 ranking officers to be Brigadier General.

But his promotion came only after a bitter struggle that threatened for a time to blacken him forever. He had married the daughter of Senator Warren, of Wyoming, a year before promotion, in January, 1915. The wedding was one of the most brilliant social af-

fares in the history of the capital. Angry criticisms arose, some charging that the promotion was due to favoritism. Roosevelt asserted that he did not recall at all the fact that General Pershing was a son-in-law of Senator Warren when he promoted him.

Of his three little baby daughters who were burned to death when his wife lost her life, one was born in Tokyo, Japan, in 1909, while the two Captain Pershing was military attaché at the Japanese embassy; one was born in Baguio, Philippines, in Bus, and the youngest was born in Zamboanga, Philippines, in 1912.

General Pershing's first fighting experience was against the Indian outlaw Geronimo on a punitive expedition into Mexico in the late eighties. He later fought against the Sioux Indians in the Dakotas, served as Military Instructor of cadets at the Fairmount of Nebraska, and as administrator of affairs in the provinces of Mindanao, tongues of many Indian and Philippine tribes. General Pershing was sent to the Mexican border in 1912, and served continuously there.
