SLAUGHTER JURY IS UNABLE TO AGREE

Reported Jury Stands 8 to 4 --Trouble Feared If He Is Acquitted

Oroville, Cal., April 1.—It was stated today that the jury in Rev. Madison Slaughter's trial on a charge of attacking 15 year old Gertrude Lamson, voted 8 to 4 for conviction when its first ballot was cast after breakfast today.

Deputy sheriffs closely guarded the jury-room doors today, permitting no person to come near them as the voices of the men deciding Slaughter's fate were plainly audible in the hallway when the debate became heated.

Slaughter strolled around the court-house manifesting no signs of nervousness as the day wore on. Reading newspaper reports that he was shaken and that the jury was voting against him, Slaughter sought out his lawyer, Guy C. Kennedy, in the yard and asked him about it.

"That's damned reporter talk," asserted Kennedy.

Both sides are sanguine of getting the verdict.

When the jury comes in with its verdict the news will be spread in Oroville by the ringing of the old town bell, which for many years has changed out startling tidings to the people. Almost every person in town who can possibly do so has arranged to rush to the court-house when the bell rings. Slaughter will be closely guarded lest there be a demonstration in the event of an acquittal.

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CLYDE B. AITCHISON TO BE DIRECTOR ON NAT'L COMMISSION

Governor Will Appoint Republican Nominee To Fill Vacancy

Clyde B. Aitchison, of the State Public Service Commission, will assume the directorship of the railroad commissioners' association at Washington, D. C., at a salary of \$3,500 a year, according to the report at the state house today. Mr. Aitchison's resignation from the Oregon commission will take effect June 1. Governor Withycombe stated some time ago that in case Mr. Aitchison resigned he would appoint the republican nominee for public service commissioner from eastern Oregon to fill the vacancy.

Mr. Aitchison's appointment, it is understood, was made some time ago but he had deferred his acceptance pending the completion of a two year appraisal of the properties of the Portland Railway Light & Power company which is now nearly finished.

GERMANY TO INVESTIGATE

Washington, April 1.—Germany has promised an immediate investigation of the charge that Teuton submarines have renewed their campaign of torpedoing without warning allied merchantmen carrying Americans, according to Ambassador Gerard's report today. He said he was unable to learn how soon the desired information might be obtainable.

With specific data en route from several American consuls and these assurances given Gerard, it is believed all the facts in the case will be laid before President Wilson within a week. Thus far the government's proof has been so insignificant that it has been impossible to base a definite course of action upon it.

COURT HOUSE NEWS

Charles James alias Charles Adams entered a plea of guilty to a charge of petit larceny in department No. 1 of the circuit court today and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail and immediately began serving his sentence.

Patrick O'Connell who was indicted on a charge of perjury was released on his own recognizance. C. W. Scott, who was indicted on a charge of selling a pistol without a permit, entered a plea of not guilty today and his hearing was set for Wednesday, April 5. Rex Turner and Cleve Simkins, who were jointly indicted on a charge of misappropriation of state funds were arraigned today in department No. 1 of the circuit court and will enter their pleas April 5 at 9 a. m. E. N. Tracy and T. H. Tracy, who are under indictment on a charge of selling wood "at a greater measure than its true measure" have been released on their own recognizance and E. N. Tracy will be tried Thursday morning and T. H. Tracy in the afternoon.

A. Alpin, who was arrested at Woodbury yesterday and brought to this city by Deputy Sheriff Needham, was not arraigned today in the circuit court. Alpin, who is familiarly known as "Snake" Alpin was indicted on five counts charging illicit liquor selling and on each count the bail was fixed at \$25 and in default of the bail Alpin was lodged in the county jail to await trial.

The case of the state against Harry Walling, charged with non-support was dismissed upon the motion of the district attorney on the grounds of insufficient evidence. The case of the state against J. W. Young was also dismissed on the same grounds. Both of these cases were continued from last term.
