Sacramento, Cal., April 2.—In order to raise \$75 to pay a board on a hill, W. R. Smith, Jr., aged 19, a son of a Nevada county rancher, held up the Oak Park branch of the Sacramento bank today and secured \$1,000 in silver.

Smith was captured 15 minutes after following a running chase of one mile through streets and across lots, during which he emptied both his revolvers at his pursuers.

His job was purely that of an amateur. He had pasted stuffing from an automobile cushion over his chin and looked like a wild man. He roamed through the streets of Oak Park with the "whiskers" on his face several hours before robbing the bank.
