Educators to Meet Here Friday and Saturday

Educators of prominence from all parts of the state will meet in Salem Friday and Saturday of this week at the conference of the Oregon Social Hygiene society. President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon will preside at the meeting Friday evening and President W. J. Kerr, of the O. A. C. Saturday morning. The Saturday afternoon session will be presided over by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of instruction.

Eugene and the University of Oregon will be well represented at the meetings. Among those who have promised to come are: Mrs. P. W. Campbell, Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, Dr. George Rebec, head of the department of philosophy of the University, Miss M. L. Cummings, head of the U. of O. physical training department, Miss Ann McMeicken, instructor in the Eugene High school, Mrs. Eric W. Allen, and W. R. Rutherford, superintendent of the Eugene schools.

Dr. H. D. Sheldon, head of the education department, will give a paper Saturday on "The Preparation of Teachers." Dr. E. S. Conkling of the psychology department, will give a paper on "What qualifications should teachers of biology, domestic science, and physical training have to make the proper persons to teach facts of sex life." Earl Kilpatrick, secretary of the extension division, will lead the discussion on the need of sex education in schools and colleges, on Saturday. Professor Fred C. Ayer, of the education department, will lead the discussion on the "Accomplishments of the past year in colleges."

Following the action of the city council last night, this morning a contract was entered into with the Holston-Feenbaugh company of Portland for a rock crusher, one that will crush rock, make screenings and make rock sand. The cost of the crusher is \$1,750. The order for the paving plant was also delivered to the agent of the Koehring Machinery company of Milwaukee this morning. According to this order, the paving plant will cost \$3,943.80. As shipment will be made from Milwaukee, it will probably be 30 or 40 days before the arrival of the plant. Ford Leads for President In Wisconsin Primaries

Detroit, Mich., April 4.—Henry Ford was 1,900 votes ahead of United States Senator William A. Smith today for the republican nomination in the Michigan presidential preference primary. The count, however, was only partially complete in five precincts and Smith was gradually gaining. Election officials stated the result would not be available for hours.

Woodrow Wilson was the only democratic candidate. William G. Simpson of Detroit, third republican presidential candidate, received only a small vote. In a number of counties, republicans wrote Theodore Roosevelt's name on the ballot.
