WILL IMPROVE FAIR CAMPING GROUNDS

Will Raise Money by Subscription for Employing Regular Caretaker

The first move towards making the camping grounds at the state fair a suitable place for campers was made last evening at the meeting of the civic department of the Salem Commercial Club. The committee appointed to take up the matter, reported in favor of raising money by subscription whereby a regular caretaker could be appointed and the grounds kept in such a sanitary condition that not only regular campers would be attracted, but that touring parties would find it a desirable place to stop while visiting the capital of the state. The state fair board has already planned for the proper sanitation of the grounds. Water will be brought to the grounds, sidewalks built and attention given to proper drainage. In order to pay for a caretaker and begin this work, about \$200 will be required in addition to the cost of the proposed pavilion. With a pavilion with a dancing floor, lockers, shower baths it was thought enough permanent campers would be attracted to make it a paying investment for the city. Nothing will be done by this department of the commercial club regarding a public swimming beach this summer, as it is felt that the children will be properly taken care of in the swimming pool and playgrounds to be located in the J. H. Albert pasture during the summer. A tour and map book of all the roads leading out of Salem will be prepared by a committee composed of Fred E. Mangis as chairman, W. M. Hamilton, Dwight Misner, William Brown and C. C. Foreman. This committee meet today noon and made arrangements to begin every bridge, turn of road, cross roads and even grades of roads will be marked and this information will be forwarded to the automobile association of Portland to be used in the road book of Oregon soon to be issued.

Election was held in Dallas, Monday, for the offices of councilmen of the first, second and third wards. The election was one of the quietest in the history of the city, no opposition appearing on the ballots to the men who were seeking to serve the city a second term on the council. In the first ward, Z. M. Knight was elected by a vote of 112. The name of John E. Sibbey was written in by a number of voters and he received 45 votes. In ward two, M. B. Young the candidate for re-election was opposed by George Branson whose name was written in by about 35 supporters. Mr. Young however received 121 votes. In the third ward, the regular candidate, Wm. Ellis, received but 36 votes, the name of P. J. Cind being written in and supported by 61 voters. The vote as a whole was the lightest cast in the city for several years.
