Six Accidents Reported to Commission This Week

Six accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission from Marion county for the week ending April 6. Following is the list: Leonard Leader, Mill City, cut knee cap, logging; George P. Palas, Silverton, injured leg, sawmill; P. Dickman, Silverton, cut hand, sawmill; Vard A. Hughes, Salem, cut hand, construction; William P. Shand, Salem, fingers cut off, sawmill; Jim Jinkos, Mill City, bruised groin, sawmill.
During the past week, March 31 to April 6, inclusive, there were reported to the state industrial accident commission 214 accidents of which 4 were fatal.
Of the total number reported 155 were subject to the workmen's compensation act; 27 were from public utility corporations; 30 were from other firms and corporations who have rejected the provisions of the act; 2 were

from firms and corporations who do not employ labor in hazardous occupation.

Prison Flax Plant Is Hive of Industry

up a new endeavor for the farmers of the Willamette valley.
The Prison School.
Frank Davey, the prison school master, has about 60 "boys" in his prison school which is being conducted in one end of the most southerly of the prison shops. The building has been painted white inside and is a well lighted school room. The boys have learned the lesson of industry and are hard workers. No paper wads besmear the blackboard, no cat-o-nine-tails adorns the masters desk and no whispering or gum chewing is evident; otherwise the school is about the same as any other school except that the pupils carry

their pipes and tobacco to school though they do not use them during school hours.

Some of the boys are grey haired, some of them have thin patches on top but all are "boys" in enthusiasm and endeavor to learn the subjects taught in the prison school. The prisoners are grouped according to their previous education and ability to assimilate and as the pupil advances he is promoted to the next class. Some fifteen of the pupils are foreigners of various nationalities and these are being taught the English language in order that they may better cope with the problems that confront them in America, when they are released.

Mr. Davey is assisted by two instructors who are convicts but have had advanced educational training and classes in reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, history, civil government, geography and other subjects are earnestly bending to their tasks. The prison school room will seat 216 pupils and it is expected that the enrollment will increase materially in the winter when the outside gangs are not able to work, because only those that have nothing else to do are enrolled in the school and no man can get out of work by going to school.

Unfortunately Driver Was Not the One Killed

Tacoma, Wash., April 7.—In an automobile smash near Kent, in which three machines collided, one woman received injuries from which she died early today, while eight others were injured.

The dead: Mrs. Minnie Hogue, a Payallup nurse. The injured: William Ryan, Tacoma, head hurt and injured internally; Mrs. William Ryan, lacerated scalp and internal injuries; Mrs. S. E. Sanders, of Thomas, internally injured; Less seriously hurt: Tony Berens, Gardeville; George Berens, aged 12; George W. Ninemier, of Montesano; Fred Beeler, of Thomas; Mrs. Fred Beeler.

The accident happened last evening on the Pacific highway when Ryan attempted to pass a small car in which were three persons driving toward Seattle. Another machine driven by Beeler was coming from Seattle. As Ryan said to have been driving at a terrific speed, swung his car around the one ahead, it skidded back and forth, and then bumped into the Beeler car. Every one of the five occupants of the machine driven by Ryan were thrown out, Mrs. Hogue being pitched about 20 feet and suffering a fractured skull. The small Seattle bound car escaped damage except for a broken lamp.
