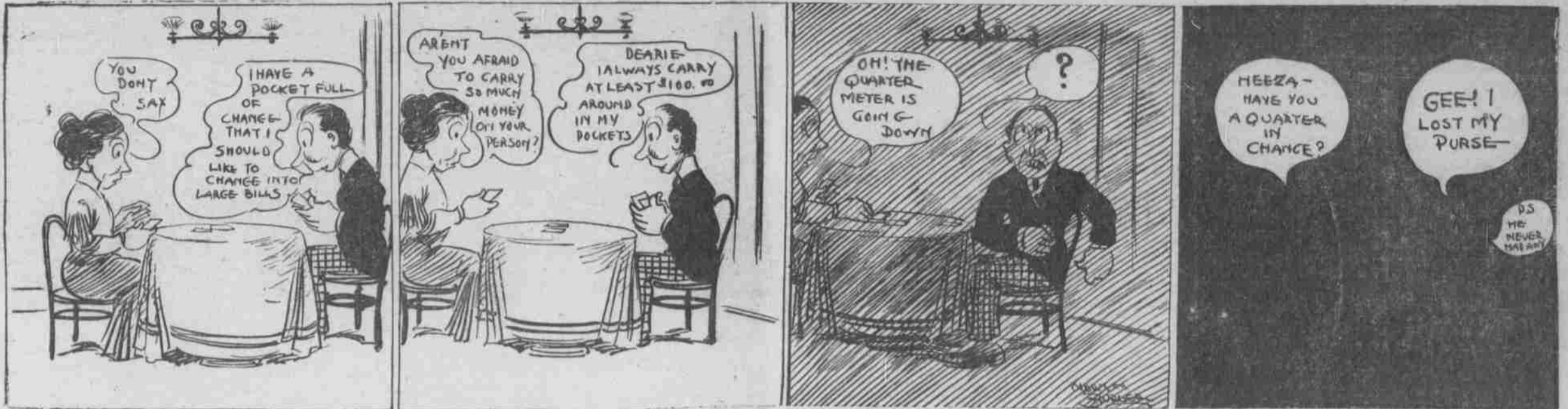

Bousman Pleads Guilty to Murder of Akers
Grants Pass, Or., April 7.—When arraigned in circuit court today charged with the murder of Luther B. Akers and wife, at Wilderville, in February, M. D. Bousman, Sr., entered a plea of guilty to the indictment of second degree murder. He will be sentenced at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

Bousman ambushed and shot Mr. and Mrs. Akers, with whom he had difficulties over line fences. He also shot both horses which the Akers were driving on their way to Sunday school.
