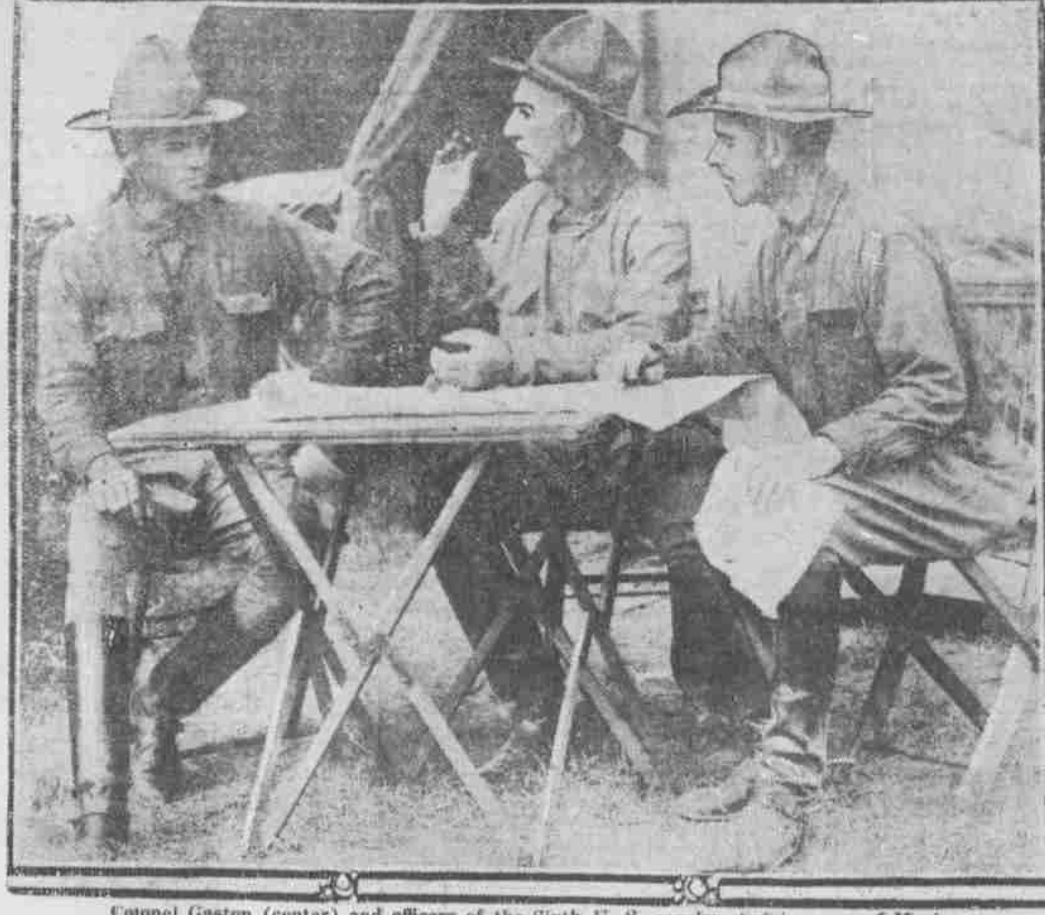

Clip Will Total About A Half Million Pounds

Mohair prices have taken a sudden jump and instead of buyers paying 22 cents, delivered in Portland, as they have been doing for some time, they have raised their ante two cents to 24 cents a pound, laid down here. That is some price and growers would appear to be foolish if they did not accept it.

Wool Prices High

There is a deadlock between the buyers of wool and sellers in this state. Naturally growers want all there is in it and buyers want, on their part, to get the supplies at as low a figure as possible. It is understood, but not fully confirmed, that sellers are asking from 20 to 24 cents for fine wool, according to the quality of it, and 30 cents for coarse. It seems to be the impression that buyers are willing to pay 16 to 20 cents for fine and only 25 cents for coarse. It is known that a few sales have been made at this price, but there then, it is claimed, growers have tightened and are practically a unit in demanding 30 cents.

First Spring Lambs Reach Front Street

The first shipment of dressed spring lambs to reach Front street this season came this morning on the Everett & Farrell from Roseburg. There were only one or three in the lot, but they were not allowed to hang in the meat room very long before being sold. The price paid was 15 cents a pound, or two cents more than the live price at the Union stock yards.
