MARRIED THREE WEEKS MRS. HOWARD SUICIDES

Portland Woman Secured Judgment Against Him for Breach of Promise

Omaha, Neb., April 11.—While arrangements were made today for the removal of Mrs. Joseph E. Howard's body to Chicago for burial, the coroner questioned her husband, vaudeville singer now on the Orpheum circuit, to see if he could throw any light on the reasons for his wife's suicide.

Three weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Howard were married in Los Angeles. Mrs. Howard formerly was Countess Mourik De Beaufort. Her husband departed on his theatrical travels, planning to meet his bride here. Upon arriving in Omaha, however, it is asserted he registered under an assumed name and the wife had difficulty in locating him.

Afterward, Mrs. Howard went to another hotel with an actress acquaintance and at the first opportunity committed suicide by shooting. Her companion said she seemed temporarily insane.

News of his bride's death was brought to Howard just before he had to go on the stage and sing rag time. He was greatly shocked, but went through with his performance.

Before her marriage to the Count De Beaufort who is now fighting in the German army, Mrs. Howard was Miss Irma Kilgallon, daughter of a Chicago millionaire. The divorce proceedings by which she was separated from the count attracted widespread attention.

May Have Been Cause. Portland, Ore., April 11.—Mrs. Edah Witherspoon, who two weeks ago secured breach of promise judgment against Joseph Howard, vaudeville singer and composer for \$6,833, was shocked today at the news that Howard's bride had committed suicide.

Jealousy the Cause. Omaha, Neb., April 11.—Details of the suicide of Mrs. Joseph E. Howard, wife of the song writer and vaudeville performer, revealed today by the coroner, showed that she shot herself in the fore head with a small revolver still bearing the price tag "48" while Howard was in a dressing room at the Orpheum theatre, several blocks distant, preparing for his act.

Following her reported quarrel Howard, whom she married three weeks ago in Los Angeles, the former Countess De Beaufort went directly to the hotel apartment of Mrs. Clara Lamberti, an actress on the same bill with Howard, and there committed suicide.

The news was brought to Howard while he was making up. He murmured something about it "all being in God's hands," then stepped into the glare of the footlights and sang his comedy songs. Probably his thoughts reverted to the night two years before when he received telegraphic word of the death of his first wife, Mabel Barrison, as he stood in the wings of a local theatre listening for his cue.

When he was located today Howard admitted having advised his wife Monday to return to the Chicago home of her millionaire father, M. H. Kilgallon, steel magnate. He bought her a ticket, he said, but she decided not to go immediately, telling him she would catch a later train.

Friends said Mrs. Howard's nerves had been wrecked by her marriage to Count De Beaufort, now in the German army. Howard, being an actor, associated with many pretty women. Ethely Clark, who appeared in his "turn" with him, was one of the prettiest. His wife feared she would lose him.

Miss Clark said today she was merely a business associate of Howard, and had no other interests in him.

An inquest into the suicide of Howard will be conducted tomorrow.

Looter of Insurance Funds Faces Jury

Taoma, Wash., April 11.—Taking of testimony in the case in which Arthur Young, former saloonman of this city, is charged with first degree forgery for his alleged participation in the looting of the state industrial insurance fund of nearly \$20,000 was begun here today before Superior Judge Card.

Assistant Attorney General John M. Wilson is conducting the prosecution. The specific charge against Young is that he cashed a warrant for \$575.90, issued in favor of a fictitious "John Morgan," in payment of a fraudulent claim for compensation for an injury.

Ask S. P. Company To Electrify Lines

The Dallas Commercial club will make an effort to induce the Southern Pacific company to electrify its road from Gerlinger to this city when that company continues the electrification of its line from Whitson to Corvallis, and to run its regular west side passenger trains into Dallas. During the discussion of the question, which was introduced by Mr. Soehren of the railroad committee, it was brought out that the matter of electrifying the Salem & Falls City line had already been taken up with the Southern Pacific company by the Oregon Power company, whose extensive plant in this city is capable of supplying "juice" for this purpose, and that the proposed improvement was under consideration by the officials of the railroad company.

It is probable that when Vice-President Campbell returns to Portland from San Francisco, where he is detained on important railroad business, this improvement, together with the possibility of getting the company to put Dallas on the main west side line by running through this city and on to Mouth and Independence, connecting with its main line at that point, will be taken up with him and urged. While it would necessitate the purchase of right of way and the building of additional trackage between Mouth and Independence, the distance is only about two miles, it is thought that the benefits that would accrue to the company through the change would warrant the expenditure. If this cannot be accomplished, however, the electrification of the four miles between Gerlinger and this point, and the operation of all regular passenger trains into Dallas will be strongly urged.—Dallas Observer.
