### HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS APPRECIATE LIBRARY

### Report Shows 1476 Books Taken During March for Home Reading

The monthly report of Miss Flora M. Case, school librarian, made to the school board at the meeting Monday night, will give the public a general idea of the amount of reading done by the different grades of the public schools.

During the month of March, 1,476 books were taken out of the public library by the high school students for home reading. The average daily circulation of books from the high school was 72. The total attendance at the library numbered 5,497, making a daily average attendance of 249. These figures show to what a great extent the high school students are taking advantage of the public library, as out of a total attendance at the school of about 800, the average daily attendance at the library was 249.

In the three junior high schools, Lincoln circulated 104 books during the month, Grant 134 and Washington 554, making a total for the three junior high schools of 792. The attendance in the library of Washington school for the month was 1,003.

In the grade schools, 115 books were issued to the teachers and 109 pictures sent to teachers for special work. During the month 332 pictures were added to the collection.

Four story hours were conducted during March and the total attendance was 312, making an average attendance of 78.

The main attraction at the Literary Friday night was the address by Prof. Von Eschen on "Soils of Oregon." The many kinds of Oregon soils were named and described and their good and bad points mentioned. The professor

told how the various soils should be handled for the best results. He considers the only loam of the Willamette valley as being one of the best soils in the state. The use of dynamite in setting trees was recommended for stony heavy soils, provided the work is properly done. He closed his address with a brief allusion to the geology of the state; telling how the Willamette valley was once a part of the ocean bed and later became a sound or arm of the sea.
