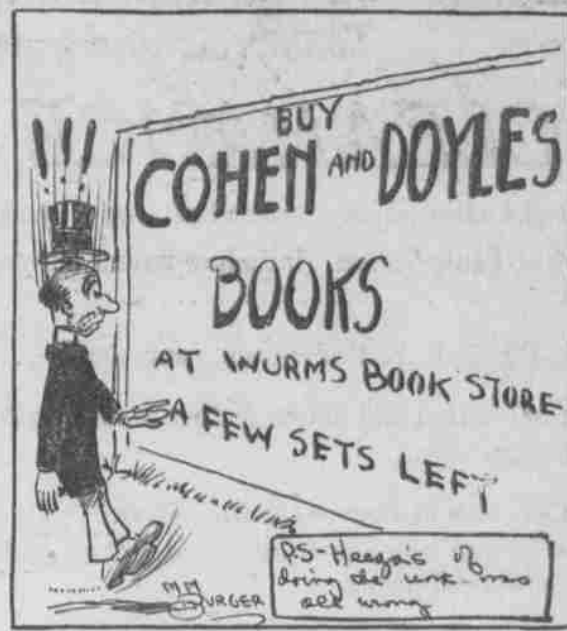


"HEEZA BOOB," as a Sign Painter

The long expected advance in sugar was announced this morning. This will bring the retail of cane sugar up to \$8.15 a hundred and beet sugar to \$7.95 a hundred.
