**WORK ON SURVEY**  
**PROGRESSING FINELY**  
**Reports From Stayton Tell of**  
**Location of Salem-Bend**  
**Railway**

The work of surveying for the new electric line is nearly completed to a mile above Mill City. The surveyors are now putting on the finishing touches, "trying in" the section corners and getting the line in perfect shape to be put into blue prints. (And, by-the-way, this is the only complete railroad survey ever made into Stayton.) Some time will be needed to complete the prints but Mr. Lynot tells us that he hopes to begin work on the grade by the 15th of next month.

The survey is almost a direct line from Salem to Mill City and reaches Stayton from Salem in a little over 10 miles and Mill City in about 33. It is an easy grade with few cuts or fills and Mr. Lynot thinks the grade can be completed as far as Mill City in about 90 days from the time grading begins. He and the chief engineer will leave in a day or two for Portland to get the blue prints in readiness to let contracts for grading. Surveying east from Mill City will not begin until the mountains are more free from snow.  
 Stayton is located at the right distance from both Portland and Bend to make this the logical location for car shops, which addition to our town would soon give us a population up in the thousands.  
 Whenever the building of this project financially makes little difference to Stayton. Our people will welcome the road and give it loyal support. While there is a large amount of freight traffic now, we believe a year's time with a railroad would see it more than doubled on general freight. Add to this the log and lumber traffic and Stayton will furnish a good supply of freight to the city.  
 San Diego, Cal., April 14.—The sport of kings will once more take the front seat in southern California tomorrow. After weeks of preparation James W. Coffroth, president of the Lower California Jockey club, upon whom fell the burden of the rebuilding of the Tijuana course, gave a sigh of relief after watching the jockeys breeze their horses around the race track for the first time since the "Hattidid flood."  
 Tijuana is the main topic of conversation in all of the sport gatherings today. The city is crowded with race goers, horse owners and bookmakers. Special trains will begin to arrive tonight and continue until the opening hour, 2:15 tomorrow.  
 Although the jockey club officials do not expect record breaking attendance tomorrow, they predict that the Sunday turnout will double that of the opening Sunday in January.  
 There are already close to 450 horses on the grounds, almost double the number here before the rains. More are due today and tomorrow. The club officials today said there will be nearly 600 horses here before the close of the first week's race.  
 All the officials are on the ground with the exception of Edward Tribe the famous starter, from Kentucky, and he is due to arrive today.  
 Several hundred track goers went out to the track today to witness the final workout of the horses and get a glimpse of the track, which was completed yesterday.
