ROBERT F. COOLEY'S DEATH.

It was with much sorrow that the community learned of the death of its honored citizen, Robert F. Cooley, at his home in this city last Saturday morning, April 8, after a prolonged illness. Robert Franklin Cooley was born in Clay county, Missouri, January 28, 1837. In 1845 he crossed the plains by ox team, with his parents Christopher C. Cooley and Nancy Cooley. They spent the first winter at Champeog and in the spring moved to the donation land claim taken by the father east of Woodburn. There he spent his boyhood days, going to school and receiving what education the times afforded. Reaching manhood, he married, in 1860, Rebecca Hubbard, also a pioneer of 1847, and they lived on part of the farm for nearly fifty years, moving from there to this city five and a half years ago. To this union seven children, Dewitt C. Cooley of Enterprise, Oregon, the late Mrs. Janet Bonney of Woodburn, Ernest Cooley of California, Mrs. Inez Carpenter of Woodburn, Fred Cooley of Maricopa, California, Rex Cooley of Woodburn, and Ralph Cooley, died in infancy. The five children and widow survive him. He also leaves a brother, A. J. Cooley of Portland; a sister Mrs. C. W. Hubbard of Salem, and another sister, Mrs. Will Jones of Waldo Hills. The brother and wife and sister with their husbands attended the funeral.

In writing of Mr. Cooley one cannot speak too highly of this esteemed citizen who was all ready to go to the great beyond. He was a man of cheery disposition, generous, of a sympathetic nature, one of the strictest probity and had not an enemy in the world. He was liked and admired by all. Mr. Cooley had served as a school director, also a road supervisor, belonged to the Grange and had been a member of the Woodburn M. E. church for thirty years. He was a staunch republican in politics, a strong temperance worker, and was always foremost in all movements for the upbuilding of the community and mankind.—Independent.

QUITS STAGE TO TRY HAND AT POLITICS



Love of justice has triumphed over love of art in the case of Grace Isabel Colbron, who has given up the theater to lecture for single tax. Miss Colbron made a name for herself as a member of Donald Robertson's company and of the Ben Greer players. She is even better known as a play writer and the translator of foreign plays. "Some people tell me I am turning back on a brilliant career," says Miss Colbron, "but I doubt it. I believe that we 'just can't help doing' the thing that we do best. I can't help talking about the boundless opportunities, the potential greatness, happiness and equality of our country that, at present, are locked up in a monopolistic land system, which makes millionaires and paupers." Born of a wealthy New York family, Miss Colbron's early life gave her no sympathy with the struggle of downtrodden classes. Later a reverse in the family fortunes threw her on her own resources. As a member of Berlin's Bohemia, she saw what it meant to be compelled to earn one's living "under a system where the industrious must support both themselves and the idle."

On her return to America she established a reputation as a speaker on economic questions, being chosen to debate Prof. S. R. A. Seligman of Columbia university on the merits of the Herriek-Schnapp bill, a modified single tax measure. Kelly sustained the demurrer. Applin will be sentenced Saturday, the maximum fine is \$500 or six months in jail. There is no minimum. Parole from the bench is possible.
