WILLAMETTE NOTES

The senior class was entertained at the home of Dr. Doney last evening.

Miss Francis Gittins and James R. Bain, of the senior class, are writing a drama which will be staged by the seniors at the annual commencement in June. The drama is historical in nature recounting the brave deeds of Jason Lee, the founder of Willamette university. The pages will not only portray early days, but also the present and the future of the institution. Both of the authors are talented along literary lines and the production is expected to be one worth while. Miss Gittins played the role of the leading lady in last year's junior play, "An American Citizen," and is the May Queen-elect for this year's May Day festivities. She has been a careful student of English literature and drama during her college course and the production which she is now working on should be of a high class nature.

Members of the class will take the leading parts of the cast and a few underlings will be used to complete the entire cast. Prof. Wallace McMurray will attend to the direction and staging of the pageant, and this insures its being well presented, since the professor has had wide experience in the directing of dramas.

The junior play, which will be staged at the Grand Opera House on the evening of May 6th, is almost ready, as far as rehearsing is concerned, to be staged. Professor McMurray, who is directing the play, the name of which is "Sherwood," said of it recently, "It will be the biggest production ever presented in Salem by amateurs." This is saying a great deal for it as the professor is not given to boasting, but is of a conservative nature. The play consists of five acts, scenes of Bonnie England in the days of Robin Hood when knight-hood was at its height. The first act is a scene in the Sherwood forest and later the action moves to the castle of Fitzwalter. The second act is again a scene in the green forest of Sher-

COURT HOUSE NEWS

A. Aplin, of Woodlawn, this morning began a 60 day sentence in the county jail on a charge of selling intoxicating liquor. Aplin was convicted in the circuit court and received his sentence from Judge Kelly this morning. He was indicted on five counts but the indictments on all but one count were dismissed.

Grace D. Isaacs has filed a suit in the circuit court of this county against William Esch, ex sheriff, and A. B. Spencer, seeking to enjoin Sheriff Esch from selling some property on Liberty and Division streets to satisfy a judgment of \$69,230 which was secured by Spencer in California, April 24, 1913. After Spencer secured the judgment he endeavored to levy upon certain property belonging to Mrs. Barnes in Salem and the case was carried to the supreme court of this state where it was held that the judgment was secured by fraud and misrepresentation and that all of Mrs. Barnes property in Salem except the property on Division and Liberty streets should be exempt from execution. The suit filed yesterday asks that the Division street property also be exempt from sale by the sheriff to satisfy the fraudulent judgment.

An order was issued by Judge Galloway in department No. 2 of the circuit court today foreclosing a mortgage in the case of Frank F. Knight against Agnes Payne, C. A. Payne and others. The findings of fact state that the defendants gave a note for \$5,750 which was secured by a mortgage on 97 acres of land in this county and that \$3,785.30 of the principal remains unpaid and is now due. In addition to the principal and interest \$500 is allowed for attorneys fees and the property was ordered sold to satisfy the claim.

John P. Seymour was today appointed by Judge Busher as guardian and executor of Amil T. Witte, an incompetent, to represent Witte's interests in certain litigation now pending.

A petition to incorporate Scotts Mills was filed today in the county court. The petition was signed by W. W. Tait and 63 others who reside within the proposed limits of the city.

A marriage license was issued at the county clerk's office today to George E. Terwilliger, a Salem undertaker, and Norma N. Leffingwell, also a Salem undertaker. Fred Willis Taplin, a Portland builder, and Maud F. Clapper, a Salem stenographer, also secured a marriage license.

It was the supper hour in Lynch's little home in the Potrero district. All day long Mrs. Lynch had hysterically wept for her two dead children. Dis-ther had claimed them in the isolation hospital three days before.

She went to the medicine chest and swallowed part of a bottle of poison, just as her husband reached home from work. He fought with her but failed to
