Preparations for a parade which will wind up at the Vaughn Street grounds, have been completed by the 20,000 or more attendance tomorrow.

Portland, Or., April 17.—Four balloons 20 feet in diameter will be released from the down town district of Portland at noon tomorrow to announce the opening of the Pacific Coast league season on the home grounds. Huge streamers will be attached to the gas bags. Every boy who returns one of the streamers will be given free admission to the game.
