Dr. H. H. Olinger was elected secretary of the Oregon State Board of Dental Examiners at its regular meeting held last Saturday in Portland. The president of the society for the ensuing year will be Dr. H. H. Schmitt, of Portland. The regular semi-annual meeting for the examination of applicants to practice in Oregon will be held in Salem. Invites of the state penitentiary will be the subjects for demonstration of practical work.

J. E. Scott, Harry Scott and Chas. Taper rode to Portland Saturday night. An ordinance for regulating the collection, handling and dumping of garbage will come up for final passage at the meeting of the city council this evening. The ordinance provides that it shall be unlawful to dump or deposit garbage in any street, alley or park, or in the bank or bed of any creek or river, and that garbage must be dumped in the city dumping grounds. The hours provided are between 8 o'clock in the morning and 5 o'clock in the afternoon, and no work of this kind shall be done on Sundays and holidays. It is probable that an amendment will be offered by the ordinance committee, proposing to strike out the holiday provision and also changing the hours.

About 50 representative loganberry growers were present at a meeting held Saturday evening in the Beuna Crest school house for the purpose of bringing together and organizing the Marion County Loganberry Growers' association. To draft a constitution and by-laws, a committee consisting of Joseph La Follette, A. E. Harris and C. Clump was appointed. This committee will re-
