The history in today's market of more than average interest in the advance in the retail price of sugar. Ten cents a hundred was tacked on to the retail price, following the advance of the refineries and the general opinion is that no one should be alarmed if another advance is announced. The market is strong.

The vegetable market shows several changes. Potatoes are now quoted at \$1.25 and \$1.50; new potatoes are down to 7 cents a pound, and green peppers have advanced to 25 cents.

Eggs, retail, are now 25 cents, two dozen for 45 cents. Storage operators figure on high prices next fall as only about 40 per cent as many have been stored this year compared to one year ago.
