R. Pommer and apparently hopelessly behind, has brought her a host of backers. She defeated Mrs. Pommer one up, each player getting a medal score of 88. A large gallery followed today's play.

INTER-CITY LEAGUE IS READY TO PLACE SALEM ON SCHEDULE

Senators Will Take Woodland's Place If Latter Team Is Dropped

The Inter-City League held a special meeting at Portland last evening and while it was not voted to accept Salem in the league it was practically agreed that two teams will be dropped and Salem and Rainier taken in.

Secretary Ray Baker attended the meeting to get acquainted with the manner in which the league is being handled and reports great enthusiasm among the managers and officials at prospect of Salem entering the league.

Woodland and Gresham will probably be dropped owing to poor attendance and poor management. Salem is to take Woodland's schedule which has practically all games at home. League Pres. Day is to take the matter up with Gresham and Woodland and call another meeting the first of next week. While Salem did not make written application to enter the league See'y Baker assured them that he thought Salem would be ready when a place was made vacant, preferring to put the matter more fully before those interested at Salem and see what kind of a local team could be aligned with.

The league was also unable to take final action in the matter and the whole matter was postponed till next meeting for final adjustment. Salem will without doubt open the league season at Woodburn April 30th and the following Sunday will entertain the Baby Beavers at home. Manager Ruppert of this team is well known as a sportsman in this locality having handled a team in the old Tri-City League. See'y Baker is of the opinion that the by-laws of the league are so favorable to Salem that the best players in this locality will be glad to sign up and he expects to see Salem have one of the best teams in the league.

"The officials of the league appear to be fine young men and there is no doubt but that the league affairs will be handled fair and square to all," said Mr. Baker in summing up the situation.

Berkeley, Cal., April 21.—That California is due to win, was the feeling on the university campus today on the eve of the annual varsity crew race with Stanford.

A large crowd watched Stanford spin over the three mile course in Oakland estuary in practice today. There is no denying that the cardinal eight has all kinds of power. They sent their shells ripping through the water at a steady gait with a strong burst of speed at the finish, and then turned right around and lilted back, apparently not blowing a bit.

A number of shells were on the water today. The California varsity indulged in a short haul to keep its sinews in condition, but the Beas were careful not row alongside the Stanford boat so there would not be any show of competition. The second varsities of these schools and the freshmen crews were also on the estuary.

"Spectacular" Robbery of Japs in Los Angeles

Los Angeles, Cal., April 21.—Detectives here today are searching for four of the most "melodramatic hold-up men" in recent police annals.

They surprised eleven Japanese laundry workers at 5 a. m. today. The Japanese, ten men and one woman had just seated at breakfast when four masked men slipped in.

"Hands up!" one of them commanded. The Japanese were lined against a wall and forced to disrobe. They were bound hand and foot by two of the robbers while the other pair covered them with automatic pistols.

Their victims securely tied and gagged, the robbers ransacked the place. Money, checks, and jewelry taken amounted to \$600. Mrs. K. Naruchi, the woman freed herself two hours after the robbers left. She released the ten men and then phoned the police.
