UNITED BRETHREN TO CELEBRATE OCCASION

of Founding Church in Salem

The 27th anniversary of the founding of the United Brethern church

of the United Breinera church of Salem will be celebrated at the church Tuesday evening of this week.

Among those now living in the city and who were present at the organization of the church, April 25, 1889, are Mrs. Fred Stump, Mrs. Olive England Enright and Mrs. A. E. Dinsmore.

The first informal meeting for the organization of the Unitarian church in Salem were held in 1888 and continued a tyer, offered to subordinate his recomuntil the spring of 1889. On April 25th of that year, the church was regularly organized and incorporated under the laws of Oregon, under the name of "The First Unitarian church of Salem." The Rev. H. H. Brown was

the first regular pastor.
