## SHAW TO HAVE NEW DEPOT AND STATION AGENT IN 90 DAYS

Public Service Commission Orders Conveniences for Growing City

An order was issued by the Public Service commission today which will provide the enterprising city of Shaw in this county with a brand new depot and a depot agent. The order states that Shaw is situated in the Waldo Hills in a particularly fertile section of the Willamette valley and that 600 to 800 people reside in the territory tributary to this station. The Southern Pacific has a small open shelter shed for a depot at this place and no loading platforms or platforms for the handling of freight or the convenience of passengers.

The commission ordered a new depot to be erected within 90 days from this date to contain a waiting room for passengers with at least 200 square feet of floor space. The depot must also have a freight house which shall contain at least 400 square feet of floor space and loading platform, toilet facilities and other necessities for the comfort and convenience of the passengers. At present the ticket office is maintained in a nearby store and the order of the commission provides that a regular station agent shall be on duty at the depot for transacting the company business of selling tickets and such duties.

A station was also ordered at Bar View on the Southern Pacific in Tillamook county and a grade crossing was authorized in Lin county.

## COURT HOUSE NEWS

Judge Galloway today granted a decree of divorce to Gabriella Gearhart who was plaintiff in a suit against R. B. Gearhart. They were married in this city December 13, 1915, and after a short period of matrimonial bliss the plaintiff testified that her husband developed cruel and inhuman tendencies and on one occasion drew a revolver in the house and shot a hole in the floor besides cursing her and striking her in the face. She was allowed to resume her maiden name of Gabriella Johns. There are no property rights or children involved. H. F. McInturff represented the plaintiff. The defendant allowed the case to go by default.

Sheriff Esch today made the largest single turnover that has been made since the collection of the 1915 taxes began. The total sum of \$61,936.63 was turned over today making a grand total of \$ 69,783.31 that has been paid to the county treasurer of the taxes collected this year.
