Both Veteri and Castelli are deaf and dumb. The slain woman was also a mute. Veteri had been the best man at the Castelli wedding and was a close friend of the groom. It is claimed that Mrs. Castelli refused to give her husband a divorce, hence the alleged murder plot.

JUNIOR CLASS WILL PRESENT "SHERWOOD"

Biggest Production Ever Presented In Salem by Amateurs, Says Professor

Keen interest is being woven around "Sherwood," the play to be presented by the junior class of Willamette University, at the Grand May 2. Rehearsals have been a daily occurrence for several weeks, and if there is anything in hard practice, the cast will present a production of great dramatic splendor. Suggestive of the merits of the drama are the words of Professor MacMurray, the director. "The junior play this year will be the biggest production ever presented in Salem by amateurs."

"Sherwood" is the product of England's great literary genius, Alfred Noyes. It ranks high as a dramatic masterpiece because of the theme, symbolic of man's tenderness to man, its perfect character portrayal, and its

perfect character portrayal and its beautiful lyric qualities. It appeals to those who are interested in a study of the drama, as well as those who look primarily for the entertainment afforded. The story of Robin Hood has a fascination for every one.

"Sherwood" consists of five acts, each full of interest to the last word. Act I takes place in Sherwood forest, and later in Fitzwalter's castle. In Act II the scene returns to Sherwood forest. Act III occurs on a green near Nottingham. Act IV is a garden scene at the castle of Prince John; and act V is at Kirkstall Abbey.

Equaling the perfection of the play itself will be the presentation. The cast has been practicing since January and has made marked progress. Besides the members of the junior class, the cast will include Alfred Schumann and a large chorus of university women, who will aid in the interpretation of the songs in the play.

Professor MacMurray, who wrote the music for the lyrics, is a musician of ability, having studied under the best teachers in the East. The last chorus "The Forest Has Conquered," is particularly well adapted to its sylvan setting.

The costumes are an exact replica of those of the time of Richard the Lion-Hearted and include the dress of Court, Peasantry, and Forest. No cost has been spared in making the stage setting the best suited to the life and times portrayed.

PUPILS OF SCHOOLS
URGED TO SAVE RAGS
AND WASTE PAPER

Materials May Be Used Again to Prevent Shortage In Paper Board

William C. Redfield, Secretary of Commerce in President Wilson's cabinet, has written to superintendent of public instruction J. A. Churchill, calling his attention to the serious shortage in materials for making paper, and urging the cooperation of the school superintendents, principals and teachers of Oregon in improving upon their students the importance of saving refuse paper and rags which are suitable for the manufacture of paper.

Secretary Redfield states that something like 15,000 tons of paper and paper board are manufactured daily in the United States, and that much of this, after it has served its purpose could be used over again in the manufacture of paper. For this reason, the school children are urged to save old papers and rags which are usually burned, and sell them to the dealers in the different towns. The addresses of the latter can be secured through the local Chamber of Commerce or Commercial club. This would provide money and would be of great assistance to the paper industry of the country. In Oregon the prices of some kinds of papers have already risen nearly 100 per cent within the last four or five months, due entirely to a shortage in the materials for their manufacture.
