3000 ATTEND HIGH SCHOOLS IN OTHER DISTRICTS IN STATE

Under New State Law Tuition Is Paid by General Tax in County

Superintendent of Public Instruction J. A. Churchill reports that as a result of the new high school tuition fund law, over 3,000 students who live in districts in which there are no high schools, are now attending high schools in other districts and are having their tuition paid by the counties in which they live. The tuition fund of a county is created by a small tax upon all of the property of the county situated outside of school districts which maintain standard high schools. Before the passage of this law, hundreds of young persons were denied high school advantages because they were unable to pay the tuition charge of from \$50 to \$70 which many of the districts demanded for the tuition of non-resident pupils. Most of the country districts and many of the smaller towns are not able to maintain high schools and in order to continue their studies it is necessary for the pupils who finish the work of the eighth grade, to go to some other district or drop out of school entirely. Reports which have recently been filed with Superintendent Churchill show that most of the students who are taking advantage of this new law, attend the city high schools in their own counties and near their homes; however, this is not always the case. As the law permits pupils who are denied high school advantages at home to go to any standard high school in the state, many of the young people who have friends or relatives living in other portions of the state where good high schools are maintained, are living temporarily with them in order to finish their high school work. Approximately 200 students in Oregon are attending high school outside of their own counties. Thus, Marion county has 55 high school students coming from other counties and Multnomah has 162. Of those attending the standard high schools of Marion county, seven come from Clackamas county, one from Lane, one from Lincoln, 17 from Linn, 25 from Polk, one from Tillamook, two from Union and one each from Washington and Yamhill counties, while two are from Alaska. In addition the standard high schools of Marion county are furnishing tuition to 206 students who live in the country but who do not have high schools in their own districts. Of this number 141 are attending the high school at Salem, five at Scotts Mills, seven at Jefferson, 32 at Silverton, nine at Stayton and 14 at Madras. As a result of the high school tuition fund law and the action of the state department of education in standardizing the high schools of the state, the attendance is increasing at a very rapid rate.
