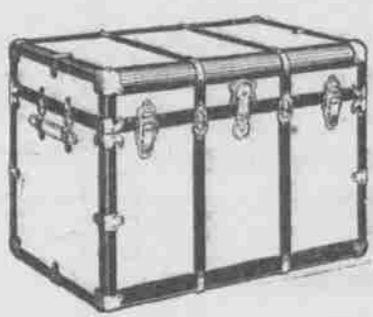
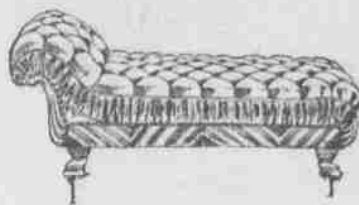

St. Stephens' Green, gathering recruits as they marched. Several policemen were shot near the park gates. A nurse wheeling a perambulator was wounded and the baby in the carriage killed by flying bullets.

Other small bodies of rioters captured buildings occupying strategic positions, including the Guinness brewery, and the Royal College of Surgeons. They attacked Dublin castle but a small force of government troops equipped with machine guns quickly halted the marching insurgents.

Monday night was comparatively calm. The rebels threw up barricades and looted stores and hotels for food. One old lady, indignant at being halted, slapped the face of a youthful recruit.

Government troops began a systematic attack on the rebel positions Tuesday. They quickly recaptured the brewery and several public houses. Artillery was trained on Liberty hall, headquarters of the rebels, and it crumbled into ruins. It was reported that several hundred rebels were killed when the building collapsed.

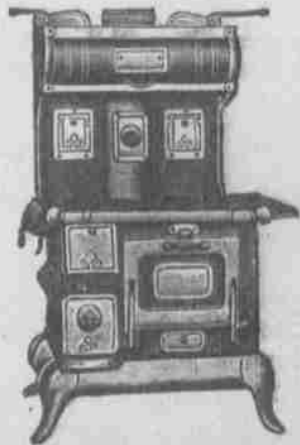
