Pioneer Lawyer Dies at Corvallis Sunday

Corvallis, Or., May 2--After an illness that confined him to his bed for less than three days, W. S. McFadden, pioneer lawyer and politician of this city, died Sunday night. He was a victim of pneumonia. Judge McFadden, as he was familiarly known, had been having a severe cold and up to last Friday continued his activities at his law office, but Friday he was com-

elled to give up and went to bed. The funeral will be held at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon, providing Brian, a son coming from California, arrives. In case he is delayed the funeral will be delayed until his arrival. Under the present plans the funeral will be held at the residence, and will be conducted by C. C. Curtis, pastor of the Christian church. Interment will be in Odd Fellows cemetery.
Mr. McFadden was born in Pennsylvania, May 22, 1840, was educated at Washington and Jefferson University, and was admitted to the bar in his native state. In 1873 he heard the call "Go west, young man, and grow up with the country," and he did. He came to Corvallis that year and went into the law office of Judge Strahn, who later became chief justice of the Oregon Supreme Court. Just before coming to Oregon Mr. McFadden and Alice Lane were married. Mr. McFadden going back after her after locating here. After a few years of happy married life Mrs. McFadden died and after a time Mr. McFadden claimed Sallie Lane, sister of his first help-mate, as his bride. The second marriage was in 1889, and Mrs. McFadden survives him. Of a number of children born eight survive the judge--they are Julian, of Corvallis; Hugh and Burke, of Junction City; Brian, San Gabriel, California; Helen and Julia, twins and the only girls; Curran L. of American Falls, Idaho, and Mair, of Corvallis.
