The announcement of the result was a surprise to the supporters of American football who seemed, before the balloting began, to be in the majority among the students.

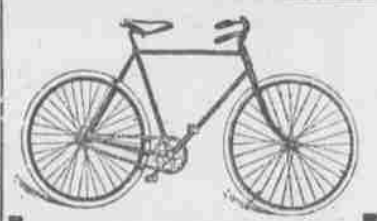

COURT HOUSE NEWS

Designs for a "Cantierette" bridge, which means a cantilever steel bridge encased in concrete, have been submitted to the Marion county court by Leonard & Day, a San Francisco engineering firm. The representative of the company who appeared before the Marion county court yesterday afternoon stated that his bridge would cost no more than a steel bridge and would combine all of the favorable features of a concrete structure with the advantages of a steel bridge. The bridge as proposed by the San Francisco firm is built of light steel which would not call for heavy falsework and then the concrete forms are built around the steel work and are supported by this steel which further acts as a complete system of reinforcing. The steel is strong enough to carry the dead weight of the concrete and its own weight and the concrete is then added and made of sufficient strength to carry the ordinary loading of the bridge through traffic. The company offered to take representatives of the county courts of Marion and Polk county to California to see some of these bridges which have been in place for 30 years.

This morning 1157 pupils of the public schools of Marion county, exclusive of the schools of Salem, Woodburn and Silverton, began the state examination. This is the largest number of pupils who have ever taken one examination in this county and over 400 of them are eighth graders, the others are sixth and seventh graders who are finishing up work in one or two branches which they have completed. Today were given the examinations in arithmetic, writing, language, agriculture and spelling and tomorrow the examinations in physiology, history, geography, civil government and reading will be conducted.
