Grand Military Ball at Dallas Armory

To Observe Champoeq Anniversary Tomorrow

The 73rd anniversary of Founders' Day at Champoeq will be observed tomorrow, under the auspices of the members of the Oregon Pioneer association. Those attending from Salem will probably take the Oregon Electric at 9:45 o'clock in the morning, go to Wilsonville and from there take the boat to the Champoeq grounds.

An address will be delivered by the governor, followed by short talks from pioneer men and women. As in the past, a basket dinner will be a feature of the day, the regular program beginning about 1 o'clock in the afternoon. Those attending from Salem will return on the Oregon Electric limited, arriving here at 6:30 o'clock p. m.

Judge P. H. D'Arcy, who has been president of the day for the past ten years, will preside. Besides the formal addresses, a program of vocal and instrumental music has been prepared.
