Notice is hereby given that the Common Council deems it expedient so to do, and hereby declares its purpose and intention to improve Commercial street between the north line of Mission street and the south city limits at the expense of the abutting and adjacent property, by grading, curbing, and paving and portion of said street with a two-inch bituminous concrete wearing surface laid on a redress of the present Macadam foundation, in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Commercial street between the north line of Mission street and the south city limits, adopted by the Common Council on the 1st day of May, 1916, and now on file in the office of the City Recorder, which for greater certainty and convenience are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice; being that character or kind of improvement known and designated in the said plans and specifications and estimates as No. 7, a redressed Macadam base, and a 2-inch wearing surface. SAYS UNITED STATES

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As far as lies with the German government, it wishes to prevent a return from taking such a course. The German government, moreover, is prepared to do the utmost to confine the operations of the warfare for the rest of its duration to the fighting forces of the belligerents, thereby also insuring the freedom of the seas, a principle upon which the German government believes itself now, as before, to be in agreement with the government of the United States. The German government, guided by this aim, notifies the government of the United States that German naval forces have received the following orders: "In accordance with the general principles of visit, search and destruction of merchant vessels recognized by international law, such vessels both within and without the area declared to be a naval war zone shall not be sunk without warning, without saving human lives unless the ships attempt to escape or offer resistance."

England, Too, Must Obey Law. The neutral cannot expect that Germany, forced to fight for existence, shall for the sake of neutral interests, secret (evidently) the use of an effective weapon if the enemy is permitted to continue to apply as will methods of warfare violating the rules of international law. Such demand would be incompatible with the character of neutrality and the German government is convinced that the government of the United States does not think of making such a demand, knowing that the government of the seas, during the war as repeatedly declared that it is determined to restore the principle of the freedom of the seas from whatever quarter it has been violated. Accordingly the German government is confident that, in consequence of new orders issued to the naval forces, the government of the United States will now also confer (evidently means "see to it") that all impediments are removed which may have been in the way of mutual co-operation towards the restoration of the freedom of the seas, during the war as suggested in the note of July 23, 1915, and it does not doubt that the United States will now demand and insist that the British government shall forthwith observe the rules of international law universally recognized before the war as are laid down in the notes presented by
