COURT HOUSE NEWS

Judge Galloway today granted a divorce to Emma Elmore from her husband, Charles Dell See, on the grounds of desertion after hearing the evidence in the case. The couple were married in Michigan in 1897. There were no children or property rights involved in the controversy. The defendant allowed the case to go by default. Attorney Carey F. Martin represented the plaintiff.

The first June wedding of the year to be reported is that of Charles J. Henders, a Woodburn teamster, and Clara Eckhart, of Woodburn. The date of the marriage is given as June 1, on the license which was secured from the county clerk today. Charles C. Smith, a logger, of Albany and Lola F. Foster, a Salem waitress, also secured a matrimonial permit.

John T. Weese and Meryl Hargrafen, both of Quincy, filed into Judge Galloway's court room with their witness and immediate friends this morning while his Honor was hearing a divorce case. The judge immediately granted the decree and turned his attention to promoting another matrimonial venture after which he expressed his very best wishes for a most successful married life. Mr. and Mrs. Weese emerged from the court room as one with the usual hopeful smile that never fails to identify newlyweds.

Judge Galloway today handed down a decree in the case of Elizabeth B. Heise against B. J. Caldwell and others in which the plaintiff secured a judgment against B. J. Caldwell in the sum of \$1538.38 with interest and \$150 attorney's fees. A foreclosure of a mortgage on Lot 46 Smith's Fruit Farms No. 2 was ordered by the decree. Smith & Shields appeared for the plaintiff.

A suit was filed in the circuit court today by John Daley and Maggie Sullivan, as guardian of Cornelius H. Sullivan against Mabel Triewich to settle the ownership of 188.47 acres of land in this county. It is alleged by the plaintiff that C. Sullivan was the owner of this property and that he sold a one half interest in the land to H. Triewich and that the latter secured a deed to all of the land through an error. The warrants for roads and highways of this county for the month of April total \$11,844.38 and have been mailed out by the county clerk. The general fund warrants for the past month total \$8852.76.

Judge Bushey has issued an order in probate court discharging F. A. Baker as further duty as guardian of Alice M. Baker. The ward attained her majority May 16 and is no longer a minor.

A transcript on appeal from justice court was filed in the circuit court today in the case of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company against H. H. Vandervort. This is an action to recover money alleged due for services rendered. The power company removed some wires by lowering them until a house could be moved and Mr. Vandervort agreed to pay the bill. The bill, however, was too high according to his calculations and he tendered \$10 which he considered sufficient to pay all costs but the company claimed some \$27. Judge Webster heard the testimony in his court March 28 and granted the company a judgment against Vandervort in the sum of \$27.58 with costs of \$16.70 and Vandervort appealed.

A decree of divorce was granted by Judge Galloway today in the case of Adelle B. Beno against Victor E. Beno on the grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. The plaintiff was also granted the care and custody of their 13-year-old son, Kenneth Beno. The couple were married in Tacoma in 1901. A. A. Hall represented the plaintiff.

Judge William Galloway has been invited by Superintendent H. E. Wadsworth, of the Chemawa Indian Training school, to deliver an address to the pupils of the school Thursday evening on the subject of "Citizenship." Judge Galloway handles the naturalization cases and has made many new citizens since he has occupied the bench in department No. 2 of the circuit court.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council deems it expedient so to do, and hereby declares its purpose and intention to improve Commercial street between the north line of Mission street and the south City limits at the expense of the abutting and adjacent property, by grading, curbing, and paving said portion of said street with a two-inch Bituminous Concrete wearing surface laid on a redress of the present Macadam foundation, in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Commercial street between the north line of Mission street and the south City limits, adopted by the Common Council on the 1st day of May, 1916, and now on file in the office of the City Recorder, which for greater certainty and convenience are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice; being that character or kind of improvement known and designated in the said plans and specifications and estimates as No. 7, a redressed Macadam base, and a 2-inch wearing surface.

The Common Council hereby declares its purpose and intention to make the said above described improvement by and through the Street Improvement Department of the City.
