KENTUCKY DERBY IS "THE GREATEST EVER"

War Causes Some of England's Best To Be Sent Across Ocean

Louisville, Ky., May 12.—The classic field the Kentucky derby has brought together in many years will go to the post tomorrow when the classic is run at historic Churchill Downs.

Because of war conditions abroad, many of the greatest thoroughbreds in England have been shipped to the United States, recently and a number of these have been nominated for the stake. Because of the class of the field, it is anticipated that such a crowd as the derby has never before drawn together will attend. Thousands of persons who ordinarily would not be able to witness such an event will be present tomorrow because of the action of the jockey club in continuing free admittance to the infield for this one race. Some estimate that more than 50,000 persons will be on hand when the barrier goes up.

The race is for three-year-olds and the distance a mile and a quarter.
