These bolts, six in to eight in number, should extend ten inches above the founda-

Erecting Silo Staves. Material for the silo staves may be secured from a company that makes a specialty of manufacturing lumber for such purposes or from the local lumber dealer. Care should be exereised in placing the order to insure on-ly select material free from small knots with good edges and with three eighta-to one-half inch tongue and groove, and beveled to give tight inside and outside surfaces.
