For the first time in 25 years there is no local hay on the market, according to D. A. White who has had a quarter of a century of experience in selling hay and mill feed stuffs in the city. The shortage at present is due to the fact that stock men in the eastern part of the state required the home crop raised for their own stock on account of the severe winter. Also on the fact that Portland and the Sound counties has been buying heavily from the Willamette valley all winter and spring. The alfalfa hay from California is now retailing at 420 a ton.
