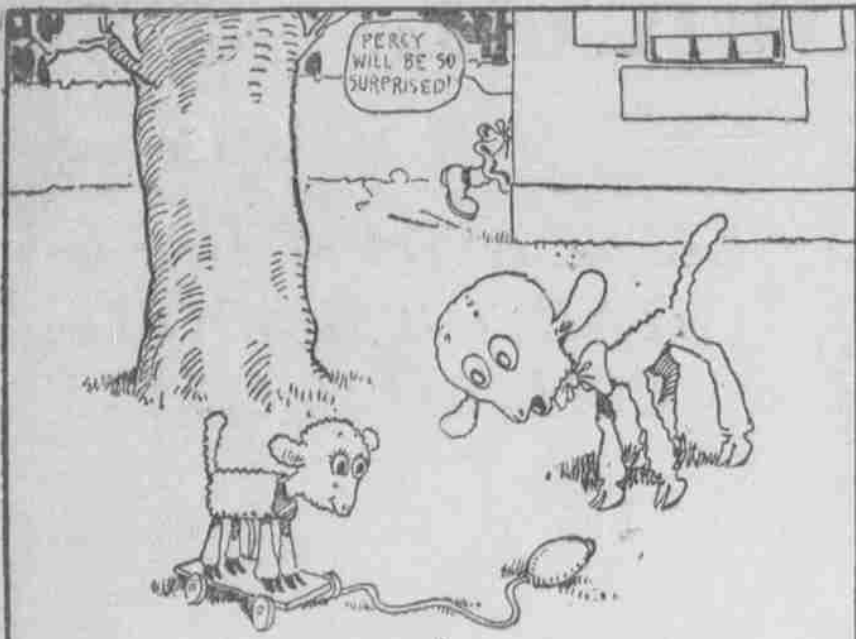


Mary and Her Little Lamb



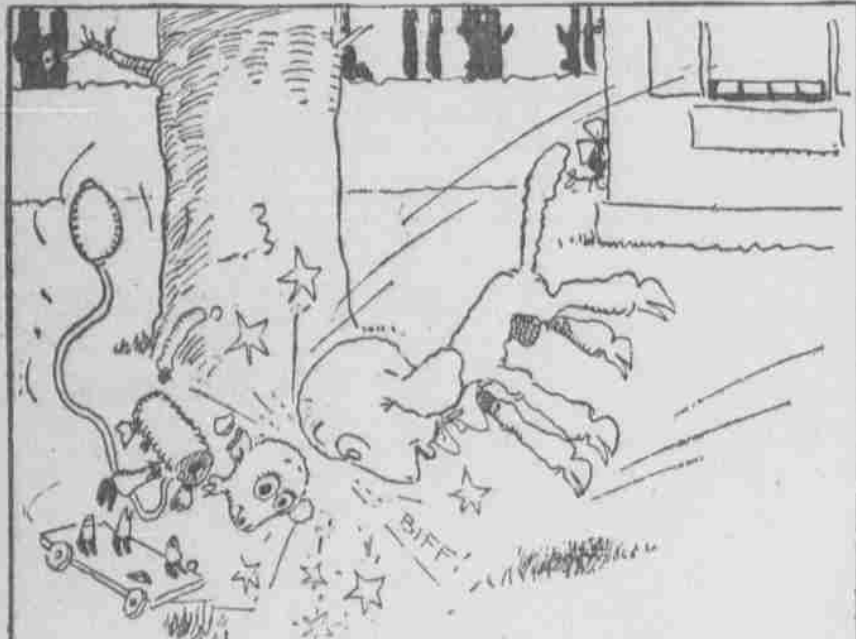

One morning Mary's lamb went out, when what should meet its eyes? Another lamb was there that she had left for a surprise?



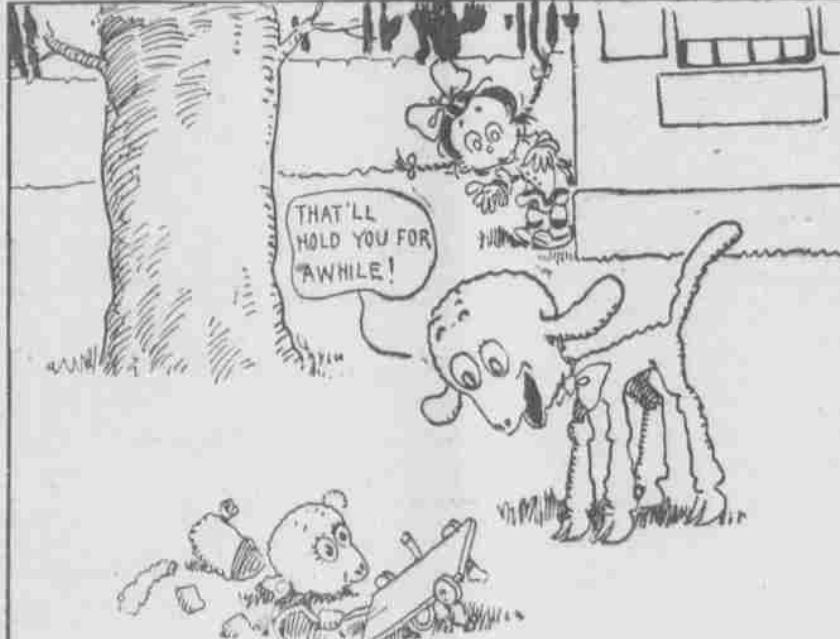
Then Mary's lamb went up quite close and said "I like your cheek!" It pressed the bulb by accident, which made the toy lamb speak?
