## Statement Issued by Dr. Carl Doney Explains Chapel Incident

Because strained relations between the Salem post of the G. A. R. and Dr. Carl G. Doney, president of Willamette university, were threatened as a result of Dr. Doney's interrupting Judge Daniel Webster in his remarks before the students at assembly yesterday morning by asking him to make his announcement of Memorial day exercises as brief as possible, Dr. Doney has prepared for the Capital Journal a statement with reference to the incident.

Dr. Doney's statement was submitted by him to the officials of Sedgwick post, G. A. R., and to other officials of patriotic organizations and was accepted by them as satisfactory explanation of the incident. Dr. Doney is to give the annual Memorial address to the G. A. R. members at the Methodist church Sunday afternoon.

His statement follows: "To the Capital Journal: "Referring to the incident in the university chapel yesterday, I desire to make the following statement: "First—The custom for the G. A. R. veterans to appear yearly before the students was not known to me.

"Second—The senior class had arranged, as in former years, to furnish the program for the last chapel service of the year. "Third—I had no knowledge that Judge Webster was to be present until I met him in the chapel. There I asked him if he desired to announce the Memorial day exercises, and he replied that he did.

"Fourth—At the proper time he was invited to the platform to give the announcement. After he had spoken four or five minutes, I asked him to make the announcement as brief as possible in view of the long program of the senior class.

"Fifth—There was no thought of disrespect to Captain Webster or to the G. A. R., and I exceedingly regret that my ignorance of the custom has led me to do anything to suggest that I do not hold in my heart true loyalty to our country and to the great men who have made and preserved it to us.

"Sixth—This explanation was made to a committee of the G. A. R., the Sons of Veterans, the Spanish war veterans and Company M, O. N. G., and is satisfactory to them. "Very respectfully, "CARL G. DONEY,"
