Maud Younger is slated to deliver the keynote address at the woman's party convention, June 5. Thirty-five thousand women will parade on June 7.

ADMITS HE WANTED TO KILL ROCKEFELLER

Italian Hurts Bricks Through Vanderbilt's Windows Through Mistake

New York, May 31.—After having thrown three bricks through the windows of William K. Vanderbilt's Fifth avenue mansion, believing he was endangering John D. Rockefeller's life, Saorches Roswrides, aged 40, a foreigner, was overpowered and arrested by policemen.

Police claim that Roswrides confessed he plotted with three other men to assassinate Rockefeller, but by mistake the bricks were hurled at the residence of Vanderbilt, two blocks from the oil king's home.

Roswrides said he lived in Yonkers. He came from Italy, 15 years ago and declared he worked at wood carving and sculpturing until eight years ago when that trade became so poor he obtained a job as subway laborer to prevent his wife and children from starving.

He blamed Rockefeller and other capitalists for his troubles. With two other men, it is alleged, he plotted to throw bricks through the windows while the others were to shoot Rockefeller when he ran out.

His confederates deserted him, but Roswrides said he decided to execute the scheme alone. Armed with a four-inch pistol, he took up his station opposite the house, with a small satchel of bricks, and began throwing them.

The missiles wrecked an \$800 mirror and damaged furniture. Policeman Lavender heard the crash and ran to the spot as Vanderbilt and his wife appeared in a second story window to learn what was transpiring. Believing that a bomb had been thrown, Lavender hurled himself upon the man and fought with him fiercely for several minutes. Roswrides will be examined as to his sanity.

WOMAN SEES VOLCANO BURST INTO ACTION

Was Encamped Near Crater of Mauna Loa When It Began Erupting

San Francisco, May 31.—Just how it feels to stand at the base of an erupting volcano was described today by Mrs. C. W. Deery of Reno, Nev., who arrived here from Hawaii on the liner Mauna. She witnessed the recent eruption of Mauna Loa.

She declared that, wanting to see the islands in her own way, she journeyed to the foot of Mauna Loa with two native bearers and a girl companion. While encamped there the eruption began.

"Suddenly there was a rumbling and a roaring," said Mrs. Deery. "The top of the mountain seemed to blow off. A shower of dirt and hot stones fell around us. I heard a hissing noise. The natives were frightened and wanted to go."

"I forced them to the crater with me the next day. The air became thick with lava dust and choking odors. At night, however, the sight was beautiful. A gorgeous red glow covered the sky. It looked like a world in the making. We remained there three days."

Steamer Maverick Abandoned by Owners

San Francisco, May 31.—The Jensen steamer Maverick was being deserted by her owners, J. J. Kohn, who arrived here on the Matson liner Mauna, declared today.

Yakima Indians Want Right to Catch Salmon

Seattle, Wash., May 31.—Filled with dissatisfaction following an interview with Fish Commissioner Darwin here last night, Chief Saluskia, head of the Yakima Indians and two of his sub-chiefs, have gone to Olympia today to hold solemn pow-wow with "Big Chief" Lister, the governor.

Saluskia will demand to know why his people cannot fish for salmon off their reservation at the Prommer dam, where a number of them were recently arrested. The supreme court has held against him.

Last night Darwin showed the chief a letter from Cato Sells, commissioner of Indian affairs, at Washington, D. C., saying the supreme court was right. If the governor refuses Saluskia's request the old chieftain will go to Washington to confer with "Great White Father" Wilson.

BOY SAYS HE STARTED FIRE

Vancouver, B. C., May 31.—Police are investigating the story of Abe Crabb, aged 18 years, who declared yesterday that he started the \$650,000 water front fire Sunday, and three previous fires, just to start the blaze. Cruiser Marblehead On Way to Portland

Portland, Ore., May 31.—The United States cruiser Marblehead steamed up the Columbia River today toward Portland where she will become the training ship of the Oregon naval militia. She was scheduled to arrive at 5 p. m. A salute of 17 guns will be fired from the cruiser Boston to welcome her successor.

The Marblehead will be officially dedicated and taken over by the naval militia as part of the Rose Festival ceremonies next week. The navy department expects to sell the Boston to commercial service. The Boston, which is credited with planting the American flag on the Hawaiian islands, has been registered as unseaworthy since 1911.

Calvin Is President of Union Pacific

New York, May 31.—E. E. Calvin of the Oregon Short Line was elected president of the Union Pacific railroad today, succeeding A. L. Miller, whose resignation was accepted. The change is effective July 1.

Calvin began his career as a railroad telegrapher for the Indiana, Cincinnati and L.Fayette road in 1875, near Indianapolis, where he was born in 1828. He occupied various positions with the Union Pacific between 1882 and 1887, serving as conductor, dispatcher and station agent. He became division superintendent of the Missouri Pacific in 1887.

In 1891 he took a similar office with the Union Pacific, leaving four years later to accept the position of general superintendent of the Interurban and Great Northern. In 1903 he went to the Oregon Short Line as assistant general manager, remained a year and became vice president and general manager of the Oregon Railroad and Navigation company. In 1905 he was vice president and general manager of the Southern Pacific. Two years ago he was appointed vice president and general manager of the Oregon Short Line at Salt Lake City.
