The annual conference of the United Brethren church of Oregon is now in session in Portland. In making a report from this district, the Rev. H. B. Dorris, pastor of the United Brethren church of this city said that good progress had been made at Hopedale and Hazelton and that at Salem all debts had been discharged.

At the meeting held last evening of the Chemeketa lodge No. 1, I. O. O. F., the following officers for the coming six months were elected: Noble grand, Frank L. Keister; vice grand, O. G. While the weather for the month of May has been regarded as quite unusual, even for the oldest inhabitant, there has been only 2.58 inches rainfall. Since the first of the year, the rainfall for Salem has been as follows: January, 5.12 inches; February, 6.31 inches; March, 10.06 inches; April, 2.59 inches. The average gauge of the river for May was 5.5 feet, with 4 feet lowest above low water on the last day of the month.

In response to an inquiry from Governor Withycombe attorney general Brown today gave out the opinion that the governor was vested with the power by the legislature to appoint a vacancy service commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Clyde B. Atchison. Mr. Atchison's resignation has been in the hands of the governor for several days but has not yet been accepted. H. H. Carey, the republican nominee for the place from Eastern Oregon, who is now serving as secretary of the commission will be appointed to Mr. Atchison's place.

Thomas H. Crawford, well known in educational circles, and for many years a member of the faculty of Willamette University, died Wednesday night at St. Vincent's hospital, Portland, in his 75th year. Funeral services were held yesterday in Portland. The body arrived in Salem this afternoon on the 1 o'clock Oregon Electric and was taken to the Odd Fellows cemetery where burial took place under the auspices of the local Odd Fellows lodge. Mr. Crawford was an Oregon pioneer, crossing the plains in 1852.
