ALLEN'S CHINESE EGG LAW IS INVALID SAYS SUPREME COURT

Oregon Hen Must Look To Democrats for Protection Through Tariff

Dana Allen's Chinese egg law was declared invalid by the supreme court today and the Oregon hen must depend upon President Wilson and the other democrats of the nation for protection through "the tariff." The Chinese egg law was hatched by Representative Dana H. Allen, of Marion county, in the 1915 legislature and through his

efforts a law was passed making it necessary to label all eggs imported from a foreign country as "imported eggs." One J. C. Jacobson, of Portland, refused to label his imported eggs and offered a cake for sale that contained some of the Mongolian egg product. Jacobson was arrested and tried in the Multnomah county circuit court before Judge C. U. Gatebein where he was found guilty and appealed to the supreme court.



Too many "iams" and creeds indicate an unbalanced mental condition according to Justice McBride who today affirmed the decision of former Circuit Judge L. T. Harris in setting aside the will of Lucy Ellen Rowell deceased, in Lincoln county. It appears that Lucy Rowell left a will in which she bequeathed all of her estate to the Western Oregon Conference association of Seventh Day Adventists and Frank Rowell, her husband, contested the will when it was offered for probate in the probate court. The county court held with the contestant that the woman was of unsound mind and refused to admit the will to probate. The circuit court affirmed the ruling of the probate court and the Seventh Day Adventists appealed.

Proceedings, opinion by Chief Justice Moore, Circuit Judge Cole's judgment for plaintiff reversed. R. Elmer L. Hise vs. Dr. E. E. Home, appellant, appealed from Multnomah county, involving a garnishment, opinion by Justice Harris, Circuit Judge Morrow's judgment for plaintiff reversed. James H. Chollers vs. Ben J. Brown, appellant, appealed from Multnomah county, action for replevin, opinion by Justice Harris, Circuit Judge Biggs' judgment for plaintiff affirmed. Lydia F. Schultz, appellant, vs. Mrs. Arika Selberg, appellant, from Multnomah county, action of ejectment, opinion by Justice Burnett, Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's judgment for defendant affirmed. J. P. Hanson vs. A. B. Robbins, appellant, appealed from Jackson county, a foreclosure proceeding, opinion by Justice Burnett, Circuit Judge Calkins' judgment for plaintiff reversed. Samuel L. Bond, et al, appellants, vs. James Ellison, appellant, from Lane county, suit to cancel a mortgage, opinion by Justice Bean, former Circuit Judge Harris' judgment for defendant affirmed. Motion to dismiss appeal in McCargar, Bates & Lively vs. Illinois Surety company, was denied. Petitions for rehearing were denied in Dennis vs. Williams and Minter vs. Minter.

Mayo Will Command Atlantic Fleet June 19

Following the established policy of the navy, which aims at giving officers of high rank opportunity to exercise important commands, Henry T. Mayo, now second in command of the Atlantic fleet, with the rank of vice admiral, will succeed Admiral Fletcher as head of the fleet on June 19. Rear Admiral Coffman will become vice admiral and second in command in succession to Mayo, who will have the rank of admiral while he is the first officer of the biggest American fleet. Another duty will be assigned to Admiral Fletcher, who reverts to the rank of rear admiral. Mayo was the cause of the Vera Cruz landing in 1914 when he demanded a salute to the colors for an affront to some of his men at Tampico. He is a Vermont man, fifty-nine years old.

William Psetak Arrested On Charge of Striking 18-Year Old Daughter

William Psetak was arrested about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon on a charge of striking his 18 year old daughter, Emma Psetak, in an altercation which took place near Twelfth street. The young woman raced down the street in a hysterical manner and ran to the police station where she charged that her father struck her and attempted to kick her. Miss Psetak was finally calmed down by Police Matron Shank and related her story which caused the arrest of her father who deposited \$200 bail and was released. Mr. Psetak resides about five miles east of Salem but his daughter has been working in this city for some time and has recently been employed at the Home restaurant.

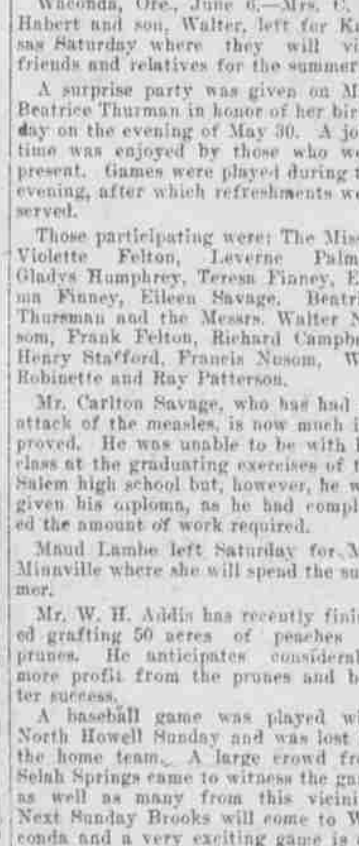
Waconda News
