Notice of Improvement of South Church Street

Notice is hereby given that the common council deem it expedient so to do, and hereby declare its purpose and intention to improve South Church street from the south line of State street to the north line of Mission street, except that portion thereof occupied by what is commonly known as the Bush or Church street bridge extending from the north line of Oak street to the north line of the westerly extension of Bellevue street, at the expense of the abutting and adjacent property by bringing said portion of South Church street to the official grade, constructing concrete curbs and paving said portion of said street with a six-inch, two-course Bituminous Concrete pavement, consisting of a one and one-half inch Bituminous Concrete wearing surface laid on a four and one-half inch Bituminous Concrete base in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of said portion of South Church street, adopted by the common council on the 5th day of June, 1916, now on file in the office of the city recorder which for a more detailed description thereof are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice; being that character or kind of improvement known and designated in said plans, specifications and estimates as "Bituminous Concrete Pavement No. 5."

Fruit Growers Meet at Dallas Saturday

A meeting which should be of more than ordinary interest to the fruit growers of Polk county is announced for next Saturday afternoon at 1:30 at the court house. J. C. Skinner, editor of Markets, a Portland publication, A. H. MacPherson, head of the co-operative bureau of markets of the agricultural college, and others from the same institution, will be present and undertake to explain the new marketing plan worked out by the federal experts and already largely adopted by the leading fruit growers of Washington and Idaho. The meeting will be held under the auspices of the Polk County Fruit Growers' association, and all members of that organization are urgently requested to be present and to decide upon what action, if any, this section will take in becoming identified with the movement. The discussion will not be on behalf of any particular fruit, pears, apples, peaches, etc., being included in the marketing plan. The meeting will be held at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, and the association is particularly anxious that the attendance be large, not that the discussion be free in order that all may have a clear understanding of the proposed plan for this district.

trict in the northwest become thoroughly acquainted with the plan and actually organized and drilled in the fundamentals of marketing including physical handling, standardization and organization. The campaign outlined by the federal authorities called for a three-fold plan. First, an explanation of the clearing house plan for marketing the crop; second, local problems of organization; third, physical handling. It is necessary that the business men if a community as well as the growers and shippers become thoroughly familiar with the details of this plan.

The plan will be presented to the fruit growers in order that they may determine what this district will do. If it is decided at this meeting to accept the plan, steps will be immediately taken to bring about the necessary organization and adjustments. Committees will be appointed and village or federal representatives will assist in perfecting final arrangements. Fruit growers, bankers, and business men generally throughout the state recognize the great importance of this matter and are aiding in financing the campaign which the college extension service is now carrying on.—Dallas Observer.
