Notice of Improvement of South Church Street
Notice is hereby given that the common council deem it expedient so to do, and hereby declare its purpose and intention to improve South Church street from the north line of State street to the north line of Mission street, except that portion thereof by what is commonly known as the Bush or Church street bridge extending from the north line of Oak street to the north line of the westerly extension of Bellevue street, at the expense of the abutting and adjacent property by bringing said portion of South Church street to the official grade, constructing cement concrete curbs and paving said portion of said street with a six-inch, two-course Bituminous Concrete pavement.
