LAKEVIEW BURNED; MONEY LOSS \$75,000

Ten Business Houses, Nine Residences and Opera House Destroyed

Lakewood, Ore., June 17.—Damage to the extent of \$75,000, it was estimated today, was caused by the fire which wiped out a large part of the business and residence districts of Lakewood last night.

Ten business houses, nine residences, the opera house and a laundry building were destroyed. The telephone and electric light system were put out of commission. Several people fighting the flames collapsed from the intense heat.

Ignited by a brisk wind, the flames spread rapidly, and had completed their work of destruction in two hours.

O. M. Elliott Gets Better Job in Idaho

O. M. Elliott, superintendent of the Salem Public schools, was yesterday elected president of the Lewiston State Normal school at Lewiston, Idaho, and will leave in a few days to take up his new duties.

Mr. Elliott was under contract with the Salem school board for another year as superintendent at a salary of \$2750 and although no meeting of the board of directors had been held to officially get on his resignation, it was given to R. J. Miles, chairman of the board, with the assurance that the resignation would be accepted. The Oregon law provides that any teacher in the public schools may resign upon 30 days' notice. As president of the Lewiston state normal Mr. Elliott will receive \$3500 annually.

During his two years residence in Salem, Mr. Elliott has been active in civic affairs, having been director of the civic department of the Commercial club.
