CRAWFORD IS HELD ON CHARGE OF BIGAMY

Sensational Elopement Brings Quick Returns to Alleged Imposter

San Francisco, June 21.—A bigamy charge was filed today against Sherman O. Crawford, who married Margaret Abernethy, society heiress, following a romantic elopement to Monterey two weeks ago. The complaint was sworn to by the girl's step father, George McGowan. Crawford was removed from a sanitarium by a detective from the district attorney's office. He will be placed in jail unless bail is forthcoming.

It is alleged that at the time Crawford, who was popularly supposed to be a naval surgeon, was winning the heart of Miss Abernethy, he had not yet secured a final decree of divorce from his first wife.

McGowan charges that Crawford swore falsely in getting the marriage license, when he made affidavit that he had not been married before.

Crawford declared that most of the accusations against him are false.

night with his department, though it settled down to its accustomed state of calm in the early morning hours, with only watchmen, and dispatchers on the job.

To Lend Release of Prisoners

Baker was early at his desk today and members of the general staff were hard at work.

One of the biggest elements in the entire situation is the fact that the Mexicans are reported to hold a number of American soldiers prisoner.

Their release would be demanded through military channels, without waiting upon the tedious machinery of diplomacy.

Pershing's reported seizure of Nuevo Casas Grandes and Casas Grandes—American Mormon colonies—was interpreted as indicative of actual war preparation. Military men said Pershing now will act at his own discretion.

The border patrol at Nogales has been strengthened by General Funston. Senator Ashurst of Arizona at mid-night asked considerable reinforcements there, in view of reports from that city that a vast number of Caranzistas are massing below the boundary.

The navy has everything in readiness to clamp a blockade on the Mexican ports. Up to noon, however, this action had not officially been taken, though navy officers admitted that no ammunition ships will be permitted to enter Mexican ports.

position's heaviest losses to date, gave ground for this view officially.

General Pershing's report remained as the confirming factor. It was due this forenoon, barring unforeseen transmission difficulties. There appeared little doubt that it would aggravate, rather than relieve the situation, reported by Mexican sources as involving the loss of forty American lives, with other casualties.

Administration officials early today, however, took the position that hasty judgment should be avoided. Until General Pershing has made formal report, they declared, it is not safe to assume that the battle at Carrizal was necessarily an act of war.

They declared that until Pershing is heard from in detail, the president will not go before congress.

Dispatches from Mexico City said today all blame was laid on the American forces by the war office.

Americans Ambushed

Against the Mexican claim that the Americans were the aggressors, attempting to capture the railway station at Carrizal, were placed border reports that the Americans were merely reconnoitering and were led into ambush.

General Funston will immediately strengthen General Pershing's column it is expected. When President Wilson takes the case before congress, he will ask, it is said, for appropriation and approval of the drive into Mexico in keeping with his threat to Carrizal to visit upon him "the gravest consequences," if the de facto forces clashed with Americans.

The last thought that Carranza is making a serious effort to check the inflamed passions of his people vanishing early today when General Pershing forwarded a copy of orders, forwarded by Carranza, to resist further American crossing of the border and to swell the Mexican army by disarming those who would not join it.

This convinced the administration that it now can hope for nothing from the first chief and his crumbling power.

A few high officials counseled calm until Pershing reports, pointing out that information now before this government is from Mexican sources. Others were for waiting no time in establishing an actual state of war.

These Orders to Start

No one pressed seriously that trouble can now be avoided.

Dispatch of the California, Missouri and Kansas militiamen immediately to the border was directed. This, it was expected, would be followed by orders to ineffectively mobilized militia to guard fast troop trains for the boundary.

General Funston reported the clash last night; officials said it doubtless would take two or three weeks to complete mobilization, inspection, vaccination, physical tests and administration of the federal service.

"But if need arises, we can send these forces out much faster, without gathering them at concentration points," an official said today.

President Wilson heard the news gravely at a midnight vigil in the White House. He remained on duty until border reports indicated Pershing would not report during the night.
