CARRANZA WOULD

This government unquestionably will make demands upon Carranza for release of American prisoners taken in the Carrizal battle as soon as it is definitely established how many were captured, it was officially stated today.

Secretary Lansing said the government might be freed of the responsibility by denouncing the act of the commander of his forces.

If the United States forces were the aggressors he suggested this government might find it difficult, technically at least, to make a demand for release of American troops held prisoner by Carranza.

As a matter of actual procedure, this government will seek the men's release, even if the Tenth cavalry men were the aggressors. This government apparently relies on Pershing's report as showing that the Mexican forces were the aggressors, but is furnishing Carranza every opportunity to disclaim it.

The returning aviators are understood to have told Pershing that the Mexicans were at fault in the trouble. Army men generally said today they did not believe the Carrizal incident by itself, will provoke war, though they expressed themselves as believing war cannot be avoided ultimately.

Following a 15 minute conference with President Wilson at the White House, Secretary of War Baker said on change in policy regarding Mexico is contemplated. The administration, he said, is still awaiting information on the Carrizal incident.

Official statement was made that no more time has the president discussed with any department official the subject of calling volunteers.

Americans in Guanajuato state are experiencing difficulty in departing, according to a consular report to the state department today. The message was not specific as to the difficulty.

Market Is Uneasy and Prices Lower

New York, June 23.—The New York Evening Sun financial review today said:

Probably at no time since the relations of this country with Mexico became acute has the stock market more faithfully reflected the feverish state of mind of Wall Street than it did today.

Traders and public alike were frankly perplexed and there was wholly lacking any definite item of news from the southern border and beyond to give guidance.

At the opening of the market was disposed to be cheerful and prices very generally advanced fractionally.

A vigorous bear drive toward the end of the first hour superinduced considerable liquidation in copper shares and munition specialties. Stop loss orders and a number of weak accounts gave momentum to the downward movement.

The fortunes of a wavering session took another shift in the second hour of the afternoon when a selling movement carried Tennessee Copper, Anaconda Copper, and United States Industrial Alcohol to a lower level than before and losses of two points or so reflected in several of the more weakly held securities. Steel yielded fractionally.

At the later trading stocks reflected the wavering tendencies of the day.

Hughes Preparing Campaign Program

New York, June 23.—Republican Nominee Charles Evans Hughes was busily engaged today in formulating plans for his campaign. His most noted visitor was Charles W. Fairbanks, his running mate on the republican ticket.

Hughes has not yet made up his mind on choice of a campaign manager. Hughes had a two hour conference with former Senator Root. The two sat out for a copy of the democratic platform and went over it thoroughly sipping out campaign issues and plans.

EUGENE MINISTER GETS CALL FROM KANSAS CITY

Eugene, Ore., June 23.—Rev. Louis S. Culp, pastor of the First Christian church of this city, the largest congregation of that denomination on the Pacific coast, has received a call from his old church at Kansas City, Mo., where he was pastor for 10 years before coming to Eugene. He announced yesterday that it is all probability he will accept. If he does, he plans to close his work here about the middle of August.

Sailing Dates From Portland Cancelled

Portland, Ore., June 23.—Owing to the longshoremen's strike the San Francisco and Portland Steamship company announced today that all sailings have been cancelled.

The North Pacific Steamship company, however, announced that they would continue to receive freight and passengers as usual, but no arrangements have been made to load the freight.

The steamer Rose City of the San Francisco and Portland company was to have sailed today. The steamer Bayler is at San Francisco, and is affected by the same order.

Andy Madsen and Sam Smith, officers of the longshoremen's union, went to Seattle today where they will meet Federal Mediator Henry M. White.

COURT HOUSE NEWS

Penalties amounting to \$1000 against John Tweedie and Effie L. Tweedie are asked by Elizabeth Caples in the circuit court today. The plaintiff, Caples, is guardian of Frank and Ethel Caples. It is stated that the Tweedies took an option on a 100 acre farm, two fifths of which they agreed to pay \$2200 for and for the remainder \$8000.

At the time the option was given \$200 was paid. Since the Tweedies took possession of the premises, the complaint reads, they have grown hops, grain and other crops and have paid nothing on the contract, pocketing the money.

B. W. Mary, city attorney, has filed a long answer to the injunction proceedings brought against the city by Frank Ward to restrain the city of Salem from operating its newly acquired paving plant. Mary's chief contention is that it is not necessary for the city to unbind the usual red tape before getting a plant to lay down the pavement needed so badly in several sections.

BISHOP OF LOS ANGELES

Philadelphia, June 23.—The Right Rev. John J. McCort, auxiliary bishop of Philadelphia has been appointed bishop of Los Angeles, Cal., according to a private dispatch received here today from Rome. Bishop McCort is out of town and it could not be learned whether he has received official notice of his appointment.
