CARRANZA MUST

(Continued from page one.)

It proposes sweeping into Mexico from strategic border points, locking in the northern Mexican forces, seizing Forton and Saltillo to control railroads and pushing through to Mexico City. As matters now stand these moves will require stripping the border patrol of regulars. At some point this must be delayed pending the arrival of militia. In order that there may be sufficient men, a call for volunteers will be one of the first steps if President Wilson decides war cannot be avoided. Two hundred and fifty thousand are the figures estimated for raising them. It will take two to three months. If war comes, it will be long, the experts say. The spectacular battles probably will occur within a few months, but the work of controlling guerrilla bands and rehabilitating the country might take from two to five years.

War Seems Certain
Washington, June 26.—Congressional leaders today prepared to receive a message from President Wilson within a few days. Chairman Flood of the house foreign affairs committee told his colleagues he seemed almost a certainty. President Wilson gave the congressional leaders notice that he might wish to address congress after receiving Carranza's reply to the American note. There was a feeling in congress that a call for volunteers might be expected unless the tension of the situation abated. Expressions of both senate and house leaders indicated today that they are more than willing to take whatever action the president desires. The senate today was to pass the resolution drafting militiamen into national service so they can be used on either side of the border. It was to be with the proviso that any man with dependents may claim exemption from the service. As this provision differs from the house action, the resolution must go to conference. Serious differences are not expected. For temporary military use, it was planned to add \$200,000,000 to the army appropriation; and to pass an emergency measure carrying \$0,000,000 more.
