That act brought upon the wretched country all the miseries that have followed. By that act he began to intervene. His failure to follow it up by armed intervention makes him an accessory to all the bloodshed, rapine and starvation which have followed.

Mexico has been torn by revolution for some years and Huerta usurped authority by assassination and cabinet order by a regime of murder to restore the tainted tyranny of Diaz that created the Mexican revolution.

Huerta, the assassin, was the chosen instrument of the reactionary clique that viewed the heritage of the Mexican people as loot—the blood-stained agent of privilege. Following his fall, the organized propaganda of American millionaires conspires to force armed intervention by the United States to 'civilize' American lives and inaugurate a regime of blood.

There is nothing to indicate that recognition of the blood-stained tyrant by President Wilson would have restored peace to bleeding Mexico. Her people would have been further wronged and robbed by a ruling class, heedless of everything save their own gluttony, intent only upon extortion and exploitation.

The European contagion demands that the United States should reserve her strength for possible complications abroad. For this reason the United States has shown a patience and forbearance towards her crippled sister state of Mexico that would not have been shown in normal times, and it will be Mexico's fault if war is now precipitated—though war
