DILLON AND MORAN TO MEET TOMORROW

Will Go Ten Rounds Tomorrow Night—Dillon Gives Away 30 Pounds

New York, June 28.—Jack Dillon, the Indianapolis "man killer" and Frank Moran, Pittsburgh "bear cat," are all set today for their ten round battle tomorrow night. They have finished hard training. Dillon contemplated only a light workout today and Moran will take just enough exercise to keep limbered up.

Dillon, who will give away 30 pounds and five inches in height when the men climb into the ring at Washington Park, has been doing three times the work that Moran has during the past two weeks. His backers, many of whom arrived from Indianapolis today, are confident.

Moran is staying at the Fifth Avenue home of a rich Pittsburgher. The auburn haired battler finished with a light workout at White Springs, before many admiring society women and was crowned with a daisy chain by a little four year old girl.

The selection of Matt Hinkle, of Cleveland, as referee, while not so satisfactory to local fans as the choice of a New Yorker would have been, is agreeable to both fighters and no trouble from that source is expected.

ORPET UNMOVED BY CROSS EXAMINATION

New Traps Laid For Him But He Reiterates Story Word for Word

Courtroom, Waukegan, Ill., June 28.—New traps were laid by Prosecutor Joslyn today, to tangle Will Orpet's story of Marion Lambert's death. The second day of Orpet's cross-examination was to be the grilling test, Joslyn said as court opened today. He hoped by sarcastic questions to make Orpet repeat the story of what happened in Helms woods the day Marion died, and to show Orpet to the jury as a youth telling a "made up story."

"We have laid the foundation for impeachment of Orpet as a witness," Joslyn said. "We will have a lot of evidence to introduce in rebuttal. Orpet's taking the stand makes it impossible for us to submit evidence which would have been ruled out before we closed our case. Unless we change our plans, we will introduce in rebuttal Orpet's letters to Celestine Youker. His denial of an actual engagement to her makes that possible now."

Although Orpet's lawyers said Joslyn had failed to shake the main points of Orpet's direct testimony so far, Joslyn declared Orpet had been forced by cross-examination to make the conflicting statements:

That he had impure thoughts toward Marion for many months, instead of only one, as Orpet testified. That Orpet had sent Marion two bottles of medicine, instead of one, as he originally contended.

Wilkinson, chief of Orpet's counsel said it will take three days to put in all the evidence for the defense after Orpet leaves the stand, and it will be at least a week before the case goes to the jury.

In the afternoon Joslyn led Orpet, step by step, to the actual recitation of Marion's death.

Orpet repeated, practically word for word, the same story he had told in direct examination. He said Marion told him she was in a delicate condition, and "always expected to be until something happened." He told her, he said, she was wrong about that.

Salem to Have Company in Gantenbein Regiment

Salem is to have a company of volunteers which will be recruited as early as possible, starting immediately. The company is to form part of the First Oregon volunteer regiment now being organized by Circuit Judge J. U. Gantenbein, of Portland, who served in the Spanish-American war.

Attorney Ben S. Via and Oscar B. Gingrich, physical director of the Y. M. C. A., have received permission from Judge Gantenbein to form a company in this city. Via served in the regular army for a number of years as artilleryman. Gingrich put in nine years with the militia in Pennsylvania and elsewhere and has been a student of military affairs for a long time.

Complete details as to the formation of the company will be available upon the return of Mr. Via from Portland where he is at present completing arrangements. The volunteers will have the use of Company M armory for drill and rifle practice.

SIR ROGER CASEMENT WITNESS FOR HIMSELF

Denies Practically All Allegations Made Against Him—Won His Pension

London, June 28.—Taking the witness box in his own defense in his trial on the charge of treason, Sir Roger Casement this afternoon denied that the Irish rebellion was in any way inspired in Germany.

Casement made a formal statement to the jury. He denied that he had received any money from Germany.

"The charge that the Irish rebellion was inspired in Germany is untrue," he said. "It was neither made nor directed by Germans."

Sir Roger was presented as a witness after the presiding justices had overruled a motion to quash the indictment against him on technical grounds. He spoke earnestly, but with a slight show of nervousness.

Casement denied he asked Irish prisoners in German prison camps to fight with the Turks and Germans. He was not responsible, he said for the reduction of rations and other punishment inflicted upon Irish soldiers who refused to join the brigade he was organizing, declaring such allegations to be "abominable falsehoods."

His denial that he had ever received German money was most emphatic.

"Those who know me, know that I never sold myself to any man or any government," he declared.

"I wish to refute this slander because often money was offered me in liberal sums and I refused," added Casement. "I left Germany poorer than I entered."

In his opening statement, Attorney General Smith had denounced Casement for accepting knighthood and a pension at the hand of the British government, then playing into the hands of Great Britain's enemies.

Casement replied that it was not in his power to refuse the offer of knighthood and that he accepted the pension because he had earned it through government service. The attorney general had made a vague allusion to his connection with the uprising in Ireland, he said, but had produced no evidence to uphold his statement.

South of Lassigny, the Germans made several night attempts against small posts but were everywhere repulsed. In the Champagne, French fire dispersed a strong German reconnaissance attempting to reach the French lines near St. Souplet.

Italians Still Winning.
Rome, June 28.—Italian troops have captured Austrian positions between Posina and the Astigo valley in the continuation of their Trentino offensive. It was officially announced today. The capture of Monte Giamonde and Carigio was announced.

Pressing forward on Astigo plateau, the Italians have reached the slopes of Monte Rastaiteroto and Monte Moniguh and in the extreme north have begun to approach Galunara valley.

For the first time in many days the war office reported active artillery fighting on the Isonzo front, including the capture of 353 prisoners and two machine guns.

British Repulsed.
Berlin, June 28.—French attacks on the village of Fleury and the ridge of Froide Terre northeast of Verdun broke down, though preceded by intense artillery fire, the war office announced today.

The war office announced the repulse of strong British attacks along the La Bassée canal and near the Somme.

Eighteen Measures To Be Voted Upon

Eighteen new laws and amendments to the state constitution will come before the voters of Oregon at the November election provided the necessary number of signatures is secured. These proposed laws have been submitted to the secretary of state and approved as to form. As time for submitting initiative petitions is up July 6 it is not thought that further additions will be made.

Nine amendments are proposed, three of which are submitted by the legislature. Among these is an amendment giving the governor the right of vetoing single items in a bill; one exempting Oregon ships of 50 tons or more capacity from all but state taxes until 1925; another repealing the provision that prevents negroes, Chinamen and mulattoes voting.

The liquor question takes a prominent part in affairs, judging by the amount of attention it is receiving. One proposed amendment would permit the home manufacture of light beer. The prohibitionists would make the present law more stringent by amending the constitution so as to bar the importation of all liquors for beverage purposes.

An amendment has also been approved in form which provides for fixing the location of certain public institutions and provides a normal school at Pendleton. Rural credits and taxes come in for regulation under proposed amendments.

Other proposed legislation includes a law providing for one day of rest in seven; prohibitions of compulsory vaccination and medical treatment; abolition of the Sunday closing law; protection of salmon; bounty on common pests; and the removal of the county seat of Jefferson county from Culver to Madras or to Metolus.
