PRESIDENT TALKS TO ADVERTISING CLUBS

Says Some Men Think the
United States Not Safe Out
of Their Hands

Philadelphia, Pa., June 29.—President Wilson stands ready to fight for the policy he is working out in Mexico. Speaking to 5,000 people in front of historic Independence Hall this afternoon he challenged those who opposed him in his international program.

"We must respect the rights of all nations," he said, "if we are to expect them to respect ours."

The president said: "I have not come here to make an extended address. I need not explain to you the circumstances that make it possible for me to make such an address."

"I understand, gentlemen, you have associated yourselves together to work for truth and honor in business."

"I wish candor and truth might always be the standard of policies as well as of business."

"I don't see how a man can devote himself to candor and truth in business unless he addresses himself to the primary elements of business."

"I come to you with this thought: America is at a point where it is necessary she must understand her ideals and put them into action if necessary."

"I am not interested in fighting for myself, but I am immensely interested in fighting for the things I believe in, insofar as they are concerned."

"In the first place it is the duty of every business man to think first of America."

"America first means nothing unless you translate it into action."

"I believe that America should be ready in every way to vindicate the principles of liberty, justice and humanity. This means you have got to be just not only to yourselves, but to other nations. It's easy to think of the material things, but we must not

be guided by that.

"I believe that at whatever cost America should be just to other people as she would have them treat her."

"Now I'm all kinds of a democrat. I believe in the patriotism and initiative of every man. Some men don't think that way. They don't believe any advice is worth taking except theirs."

"I could give you a short list of men who think the United States is not safe out of their hands. Personally I feel perfectly safe in the hands of the people—not in closed councils where a few men determine destinies of the country."

"I feel at home here not because I advertise but because I am not afraid to advertise my views. I am glad I came here because I have got much of the encouragement and enthusiasm that I always get when I touch hands with a great body of the common people."

Immediately after the address the president left for Washington.

U. G. Boyer to Succeed
Max Gehlhar As Clerk

The county court today appointed U. G. Boyer to fill the unexpired term of County Clerk Max Gehlhar, who is now on the way to the border in command of Company M. Mr. Boyer is Gehlhar's chief deputy and has been connected with the office for years.

"Considering my duty to my country more important at this time than my duties as county clerk," write Gehlhar, "I hereby tender my resignation as county clerk to take effect at your pleasure."

Mr. Boyer recently received the republican nomination for county clerk. Gehlhar was nominated by the same party as its candidate for district attorney.

"While the court has seen fit to name me as Mr. Gehlhar's successor," said Clerk Boyer, "I still consider this Mr. Gehlhar's office. I know how he has conducted the public business, through long association with him and I shall seek to manage it in the same way, with courtesy to the public and efficient service the watchword. When Mr. Gehlhar returns I shall resign in his favor."

Clerk Boyer's duties begin immediately.

LAND FRAUD JURY IS UNABLE TO AGREE

Was Out 36 Hours Attorney
Reames Says He Will Try
Them Again

San Francisco, June 29.—The federal jury in the Oregon land fraud cases disagreed today after being out 36 hours and was discharged by Federal Judge Dooling.

Jurors told court attaches that they stood eight to four for acquittal in the case of W. A. S. Nicholson and nine to three for conviction in the cases of Norman D. Cook, Sydney Sperry and Attachés of the United States district attorney's office stated that the government would renew its prosecution of the defendants.

Members of the jury today said the case was too intricate for them and said they did not understand it.

Will Try Them Again
Portland, Ore., June 29.—"We will try them again, just as soon as we can get a trial date in the San Francisco court," said United States District Attorney Clarence L. Reames today when informed that the jury in the so-called Oregon land fraud case had disagreed. Reames assisted in the prosecution of Francis P. Bull, Norman D. Cook and W. A. S. Nicholson.

Work Has Begun On
South Commercial

Work began yesterday on the paving of South Commercial street between Mission and the city limits by the city force under the direction of W. S. Low, street commissioner.

The first work includes the laying of curbs for several blocks, to be followed on the block system of grading and paving. As soon as the curbing work on South Commercial is completed, the force doing this work will be transferred to the Fairgrounds road and the two blocks of what is known as the Portland road, between Highland avenue and the Southern Pacific tracks.

The paving of these two streets will probably occupy all the time of the force under Commissioner Low until late next fall. According to present plans, Church street will not be paved this summer, due to some extent to the fact that the street between Mill and Bellevue will require considerable filling, and it would hardly be settled and in condition for paving this fall.

"To Hell and Back" will be the subject of his discourse this evening. Mr. Hinson is one of the most eloquent of evangelists on the coast and his series of meetings here are attracting much favorable comment and attention.

CLODBURST AT DAYTON

Dayton, Wash., June 29.—Streets were washed out, bridges carried away and several homes damaged by a cloudburst which deluged Dayton last night while most of the population was attending a chautauque lecture. A small stream flowing through the city was quickly swollen to a roaring torrent 100 feet wide.

Troop Train at Redding

Redding, Cal., June 29.—A troop train of fifteen cars bearing battery A of the Oregon national guard to San Diego passed through here to the south at 11:15 a. m. today. Six coaches were filled with men and the remainder bore field artillery and other equipment. Captain Charles W. Helme was in command.

dered by General Carranza, according to information conveyed to General George Bell, Jr., at Fort Bliss by General Francisco Gonzalez, of the Juarez garrison.

Gonzales said he received a telegram from General Jacinto Trevino, commander in Chihuahua City, that the prisoners had been placed aboard a special train which left the state capital shortly after 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Whether Scout Tom Spillbury, the white American captured with the negro troopers, was released was not made known. The prisoners will be turned over to General Bell.

Gonzales, in reply to a question from Bell, said he had no information regarding the disposition of the bodies of the Americans killed at Carrizal. It is feared the bodies were left on the plains unburied and may have been devoured by wild animals.

Trevino is reported to be fortifying Chihuahua City. Entrenchments are being thrown about the city and mines are said to have been planted in the outskirts.

General John J. Pershing has moved his base from Colonia Duggan to a point five miles from the river. This move, according to Americans who arrived from the front, was made after the American commander was informed an attack by the Carranzistas was imminent. The expeditionary forces are today camped upon a high elevation and are strongly entrenched.

Identifies Raiders.

The arrival stated that the Fifth United States cavalry, recently stationed at San Geronimo, captured 80 Mexicans and took them into camp. Among them was recognized a Villista colonel who was promised protection if he could identify the Columbus raiders in the group. Fearing assassination if he betrayed his bandit companions, the colonel was to be guarded while he identified the men. He was unmasked and placed in a tent with a small opening. The Mexicans were marched by in single file and he identified nine as Villista raiders. These were sent to General Pershing's headquarters.

The advance guard of the national guard ordered to the border is expected to reach El Paso tonight or tomorrow. Ample facilities have been provided to quarter 25,000 additional troops at Fort Bliss and Camp Cotton. Having been sworn into federal service at their home stations, the militia men will receive the rations and accommodations of regulars as far as possible. The cooks with the militia men may not compare with those in the regular army, but newly arrived train loads of "cow bosom" (bacon), "canned horse" (tins of corned beef and beans and provisions for thousands of loaves of "punk" (bread) from local bakers, promised a full dinner pail.

State government agents announced the arrival of additional instructions from Washington urging them to warn all Americans in Mexico to come to the border immediately.

Eleven Not Accounted For.

San Antonio, Texas, June 29.—General Pershing wired General Funston this afternoon that 11 of the enlisted men participating in the Carrizal fight are still unaccounted for. Pershing's count shows 12 killed, 24 prisoners and 32 returned to the American lines.

VERDICT GUILTY IN

"What I have to say," he said, his voice steady for the moment, "is intended for my own countrymen."

Casement's hopes for acquittal were dealt a body blow by Lord Chief Justice Baron Reading, just before the case went to the jury.

E. E. Jones of counsel for the defense, who finished summing up because of the illness of Alexander Sullivan, chief counsel for Casement, argued that Sir Roger was a loyal, patriotic Irishman. He contended that he was recruiting regiments among Irish in Germany "because Ulster had threatened civil war in Ireland."

"The jury," interposed the lord chief justice, "will be instructed that any act tending to weaken the country's power of resistance was 'aiding and comforting the king's enemies.'"

Casement was plainly depressed at the ruling. He turned an appealing look toward his counsel who hastily concluded his argument.

Attorney General Smith began summing up at 11:45 a. m.

"If only one of the six overt acts is proved, the defendant is guilty of treason," the lord chief justice instructed the jury. "If he knew what he did would assist the enemy, though he had another ulterior motive, he is guilty."

May Draft Militiamen
Into Federal Service

Washington, June 29.—Having eliminated all provisions for the relief of national guardsmen's dependents, the senate today adopted a resolution empowering the president to draft militiamen into federal service.

Senator La Follette attempted to delay action on the resolution until tomorrow, on the ground that senators favoring aid to guardsmen should have another chance to insert some provision in the measure.

Insisting on immediate action, Chairman Chamberlain said that the release of United States prisoners had by no means done away with the emergency on the border. He promised an opportunity to consider aid for guardsmen in a separate measure. The resolution was adopted without a roll call.

New Bill Introduced.

Washington, June 29.—A new bill appropriating \$2,000,000 for the relief of married militiamen's families and providing that the secretary of war may at his discretion allow \$50 a month or, as an alternative, order the militiamen's discharge was introduced today by Chairman Ray of the house military committee. "Families," including wives, children and dependent mothers. Action on the bill will be taken Monday.
