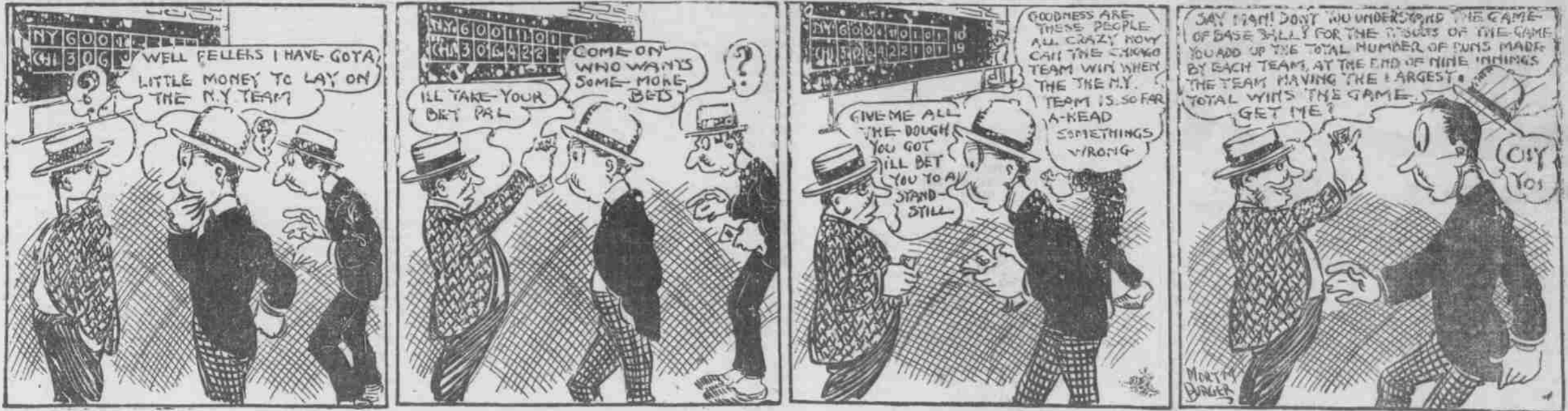

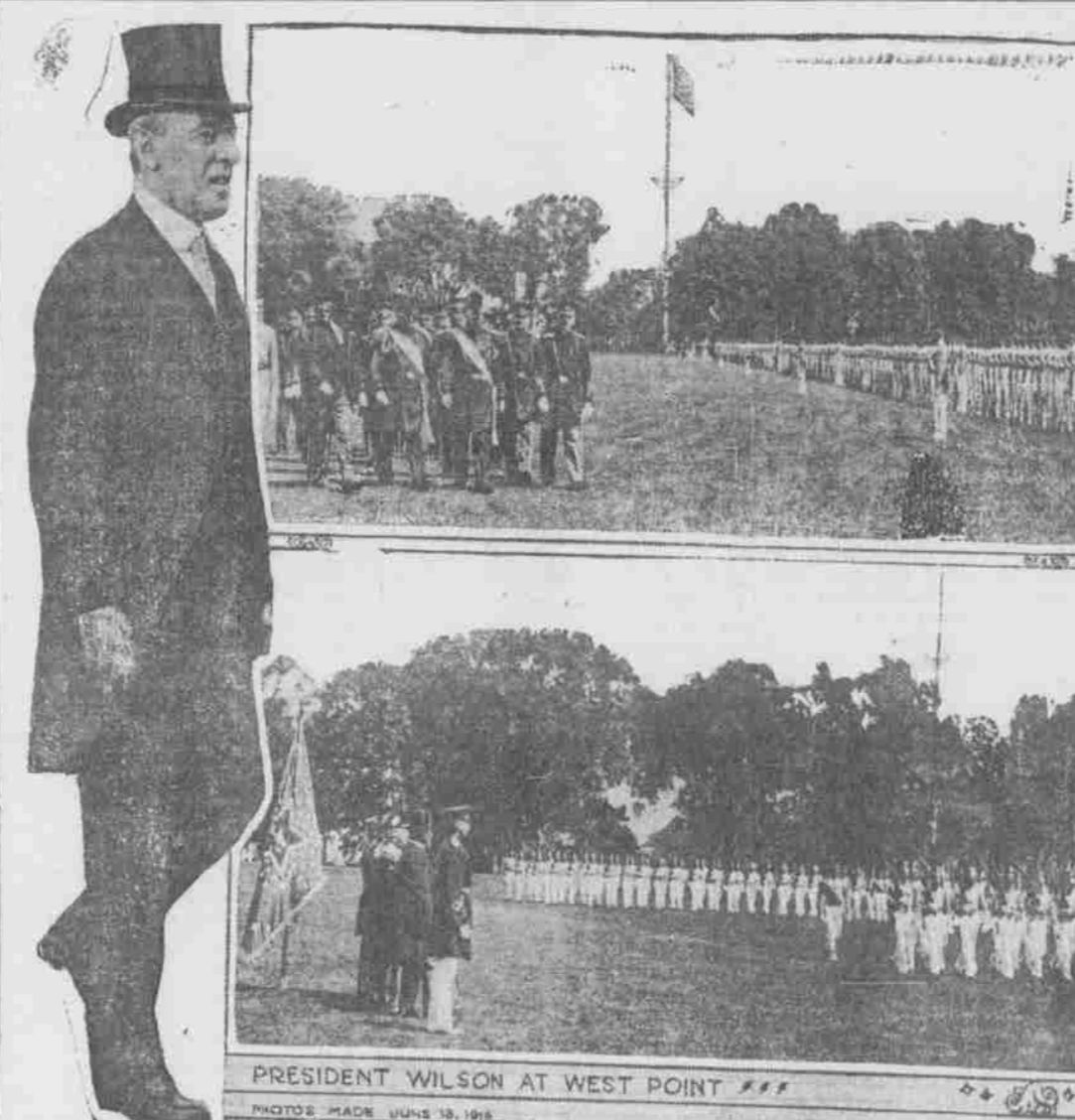

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

THE TABLE
Mushroom Loaf—One can mushrooms, one can peas, two cups salted cracker crumbs, one tablespoon butter cream to moisten well, one-half cup celery. Mix all ingredients. Season with salt and pepper. Bake twenty minutes. Baste with cream or milk. A little grated cheese is good sprinkled on top and allowed to melt.
Potato Biscuit—Sift one cup flour, one-half teaspoon salt, one and one-half teaspoons of baking powder, but in one and one-half tablespoons of butter or lard, add one cup mashed potatoes, one cup milk. Roll rather thin, cut out, and bake in quick oven.
Spanish Rice—One cup cold boiled rice, lump of butter, salt, cayenne and small piece of onion for flavoring. Put in baking dish. Pour over this a cup of stewed tomatoes or thickened tomato soup. Sprinkle thickly with cracker crumbs and bake twenty minutes.
Creamed Chicken—Make a white sauce as follows: Mix one tablespoon of butter and flour in saucepan over fire. When mixed add one-half teaspoon salt, one-fourth teaspoon white pepper and one cup hot milk. Stir until thickened. Add leftover chicken, sliced, and simmer ten minutes.
Bainin Sauce for steamed fruitcake—One cup brown sugar, one-half cup water, one-fourth cup butter, few drops vanilla. Thicken with cornstarch and when done add one-half cup seed raisins.
Cabbage Salad (New)—Two cupsful of raw cabbage; two tablespoonsful chives; one fresh red pepper; (or one canned pimento); and a few ripe olives chop separately, mix and serve with a French dressing.
