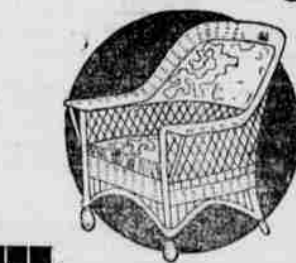

Western Oregon Mills Have 10-Day Shut-Down; Lumber Prices Are Higher

Seventy-five per cent of the sawmills in Western Washington and Western Oregon will be down for an average period of ten days beginning this week. This is an annual affair in the lumber industry—a closing down of plants for repairs and the installation of new equipment.

This year it will mean decreased production of at least 150,000,000 feet of lumber. The estimate is made by the West Coast Lumbermen's association on the basis of reports from mills throughout the first district.

Lumbermen closely in touch with the conditions consider the fourth of July close down this year as likely to be a strong factor in restoring the stability and bringing supply and demand back into proper relationship.

They also say that decreased production brought about by mid-season repairs is entirely separate and distinct from the curtailment policies at different mills, which became noticeable during the last weeks in June and which undoubtedly will continue through the month of July.

The earlier curtailment is regarded as having already steadied the market, which slumped badly but did not bog down as in former years when demand suddenly slumped while production was slipping along at the rate of twenty million feet of fir a day.

Minneapolis and other markets have reported heavy withdrawals of low prices which were sent out the previous week, although at present the actual market on many items is somewhat uncertain. It is probable that values will be more clearly defined between now and July 12 when mills reopen.

The week's trade barometer issued by the West Coast Lumbermen's association showed orders 18.63 per cent below the week's production of 56,324,762 feet of lumber by 161 mills. Shipments by the same mills were 9.71 per cent below production.

In the analysis of the barometer, however, attention is called to the fact that new business for local rail and transcontinental delivery was but 3.33 per cent below similar deliveries; and that the somewhat disconcerting showing of the barometer was primarily the result of light orders and shipments for water delivery, whereas, production at tide water mills was close to normal.

In the rail trade new business booked during the week amounted to 1628 car loads, or about 40,700,000 feet; an average of 402,970 feet per mill.

Shipments amounted to 1684 carloads,

or 42,100,000 feet, which was an average of 416,831 feet per mill. The average cut per mill for the week was 557,671 feet.—Cottage Grove Sentinel.

PEPSIN USED FOR RENNET IN CHEESE MANUFACTURE

A five per cent solution of scale pepsin in water, used at the rate of four ounces of solution to 1000 pounds of milk, has been found by experiments at the Oregon Agricultural College to be a substitute for the use of rennet in cheese making, forming a product that judges are unable to tell from the normal rennet curd.

This is said to be highly important to cheese manufacturers of Oregon. Leading manufacturers of rennet extract have been unable to secure the normal supply from Europe during the war, and the scale pepsin substitute may prove a satisfactory solution of the problem. Oregon cheese men are advised to try out this pepsin as a rennet substitute before the supply of rennet is entirely exhausted. The first pepsin cheese made at the college, May 31, has been sampled both during the making and up to the present time. No extensive investigations have been conducted as to the keeping qualities of the pepsin made cheese.

Soluble pepsin scales were used. These were dissolved in water at the rate of one ounce of pepsin to one and a fourth pounds of water—Armour's U. S. P. scale pepsin, strength 1:3000. The water must in no case be above 105 degrees F. or the enzyme forming the coagulation is weakened and eventually destroyed. The solution must be made up fresh each day a few hours before use.

The solution was added in the same proportion as rennet, that is, 4 ounces of solution to 1000 pounds of milk. Comparing the strength of this solution with that of the rennet, the pepsin coagulated the sample in 47 seconds, the rennet in 50 seconds. The milk was set at 86 degrees F. and at 21 of one per cent acid. It was 24 minutes from the time of setting to cutting. The loss of fat in whey amounted to .26 to .32 of one per cent, the original milk testing 4.8 per cent fat. After setting, the process of handling the curd is exactly the same as when set with rennet extract.

In order to bring the rennet back to normal it is absolutely necessary that cheese makers throughout the country cooperate in every way with rennet manufacturers buying from farmers and local slaughter houses. Some leaders in this movement have gone so far as to suggest that rennet should be supplied only to those factories which in turn supply the manufacturer rennet for extract making. This is for the good of all parties concerned.

Instructions have been prepared for making the stomachs of calves ready for shipment to rennet manufacturers. These instructions may be had by application to the dairy department of the agricultural college.

San Diego, Cal., July 8.—Pretty May Hayden, who claims to be 22 years old, but who, police officers say, is only 17, appeared in police court today on a vagrancy charge, following tempestuous scenes in "Paris After Midnight," an isthmian attraction at the exposition. The police charge that Oregon militiamen and officers, encamped here, packed the show and toward noon at Miss Hayden, who appeared in the nude, a number of militia officers were in court today as interested spectators. The show has been closed, Miss Hayden took 24 hours to plead.

CAPTURE OF TAYLOR WINDS UP THE GANG

The Three Boys Who Have Been "Doing Things" to Be Tried in Albany

With the capture yesterday at Riddle of John Taylor the civil authorities have rounded up the trio of young men believed responsible for a series of crimes extending from this city to Roseburg. William Harris and William Taylor had previously been taken into custody at Roseburg.

At the door of the jail in the Douglas county seat John Taylor broke away from the sheriff, climbed the fence and sprinted through the city. The sheriff and a crowd pursued the fleeing youth and two shots fired at him failed to check his flight. He plunged into the Umpqua river, swam to the other side and hid in the undergrowth. Later he boarded a freight train from which he was taken at Riddle.

The three have been taken back to Albany to stand trial on a charge of robbing the home of R. C. Margerson at Shedd's and also that of stealing a Ford owned by W. C. Fuller of Albany. In addition to these offenses it is alleged that they robbed a store at Comstock and stole an automobile in this city.

Chief of Police Welsh has been informed by the secretary of state at Olympia, Wash., that the Ford which the lads have been driving ever since they left Salem was owned by Walter G. Leechy, of Seattle. The lads refuse to say how it came into their possession.

Each of the boys is about 18 years of age. They declare they were on the way to the Mexican border. In the car and captured with them were rifles and automatic pistols besides a large supply of ammunition. At the time of the capture, tool kits and apparels taken from Ford autos were recovered.

Oregon Metal Mines Show Little Change In Any Respect During 1916

No changes of moment in the mining situation in Oregon are noted by Charles G. Yale, of the United States Geological Survey, for the first six months of 1916. The bulletin receipts of the mint and smelters at San Francisco show that the output of gold has increased \$107,000 and that of silver 14,000 ounces in the first five months of 1916 over the output of the corresponding period in 1915. The increase in gold is due entirely to dredging operations. The Powder River Gold Dredging company, which in the first half of 1915 had but one dredge operating, near Sumpter, Baker county, has been working with two dredges during the first six months of 1916. With the exception of three deep mines, all in Baker county, this is the largest gold-mining enterprise in Oregon.

The properties of the Cougar Mining company, near Sumpter, have been placed under lease and bond to the United Gold Mining company, of Spokane, Wash. In addition to the 200-ton mill, tube mills and a cyanide plant are to be installed. The Queen of Bronze Copper mine, which ships its ore from Waldo by team to Grants Pass and thence by rail to smelters at Kennett and Tacoma has been sold to men who intend to extend a railroad to Waldo. After years of idleness work has been resumed on the Iron Dyke mine at Copeland, which is shipping ore to Colorado for reduction. The Black Eagle property, near Grants Pass, has been sold to men who are to erect a 50-ton mill.

There is notable activity in the hydraulic mining industry of the state, particularly in the counties along the northwest border of California. Many old properties have been re-opened, and new ones have been put in shape for working.

The most productive deep mines in Oregon continue to be those of the Cornucopia Mines company and Baker
