WHAT THE COMPANIES ARE ORGANIZED FOR

None of These Mean Actual Service—But Are for Drill or Practice

Now that the military spirit is in the air and volunteer companies are being organized, the average civilian is at a loss to keep up with the procession. Hence, the following information:

Company M, Oregon National Guard, is in active service at San Ysidro, California, with Captain Gehlar.

The Salem Rifle club is an organization for rifle practice only. It is part of the National Rifle association and membership involves no service whatever. Every man who is interested in shooting is eligible. The government will furnish a certain amount of ammunition and the members will be permitted to buy Krag rifles from the government at cost.

The Gantenbein volunteers are organized for drilling, with Benjamin S. Via as captain. Members of this organization are not liable for service.

The Auxiliary of the Salem Rifle club is organized for those who are members of that club, yet wish to become familiar with drilling and military tactics. For these members, arrangements have been made for the use of the old armory over the city hall, and drills will be held Monday evenings. Captain Rosenberg is in charge, assisted by Lieutenant Ernest Blue.

The school of instruction with Captain Rosenberg in charge, is for those who wish to place themselves in line for promotion. It is termed a school for non-commissioned officers, and meets once a week.

The Salem Rifle Club does not drill, its object being only that men may become more proficient in the use of the army rifle. The Auxiliary of the Rifle Club has the following membership: Earl H. JOHN W. TODD TO BE NEW SUPERINTENDENT

Was Selected for Place Last Night, Will Bring Family Here Soon

John W. Todd, superintendent of the schools of Auburn, Wash., for the past five years was elected superintendent of the Salem schools last night.

Mr. Todd will remain in the city a few days conferring with Mr. Elliott in regard to his new duties, and will bring his family here before August 1.

In securing Mr. Todd, the board of education has elected one of the progressive educators in the northwest. Although only 37 years of age, he is well known from the results of his work at Auburn, a city midway between Tacoma and Seattle, and comes thoroughly equipped for his work.

He was instrumental in reorganizing the Auburn schools and bringing them to an efficiency equal to any in Washington. Mr. Todd's teaching experiences include one year at Camas, Wash., five years as head of the science department of the Phoenix, Arizona, union high school, four years as instructor of physics in the Stadium high school of Tacoma, and his five years' service at Auburn in reorganizing that school and bringing it up to its present high standard.

He is married and has four children, the oldest being eight. His mother lives in Salem with Miss Junia Todd, preceptress of Lausanne hall.

The other candidates for the position, George A. Briscoe of Ashland, J. G. Inel of Astoria, and R. G. Hall of Roseburg were given each half an hour in which to tell of their educational work.

Before the election the board decided to fix the salary of the position at \$2250, and to elect for but one year. On the first ballot Mr. Todd received four votes and Mr. Briscoe one, the election later being made unanimous.

Train Schedule Changes

Sunday, July 9th, on the Oregon Electric Railway

Effective Sunday, July 9, a new time table on the Oregon Electric Railway will be issued with the following changes:

Train No. 65 between Salem and Eugene and trains 63 and 64 between Woodburn and Salem will be annulled.

Train No. 1 will leave Portland at 6:30 a. m., Salem 8:35 a. m., running through to Eugene, arriving at Eugene at 10:55 a. m.

Train No. 9 leaving Portland 2:05 p. m., will arrive at Salem 4:15 p. m. Eugene 6:35 p. m. (this train will be about 10 minutes earlier at all intermediate stations.)

Train No. 14 will leave Salem 1:50 p. m. instead of 1:45 p. m.

Train No. 5, Eugene Limited, will leave North Bank Station at 8:30 a. m. instead of 8:25 a. m. The time at schedule stops and arriving time at Eugene will be approximately the same as at present.
